Rubella vaccine is available for those children between the ages of one (1) to ten (10) years. It is recommended that parents having children who expect to enter school

in 1971 bring their children for the Rubella Vaccine at this time. As the law requires that each child receive vaccine for Mersles Smallpox, Polio, and German Measles before entering school, it is wise to start a child early on this protective program.
