Pursuant to Section 359 of the County Law the maximum per diem to be paid during the coming year to members of the Board of Legislators shall not exceed \$50 per day for regular and special meetings and shall not exceed \$25 per day for committee meetings. In addition to the per diem the Chairman of the Board of Legislators shall receive an annual salary of \$2,400.
