

Central School News

A big fire broke out about 1:30 Sunday morning in the large barn on the Hulse Brothers Farm at West Greenwood. Greenwood Volunteer Firemen answered the call and by Mutual Aid the departments from Andover, Wellsville, South Hornell and Canisteo, responded. Game Warden Russell Wilkins, was patrolling the roads and discovered the fire, waking Burdette Hulse at the farm home. He opened the back door of the barn and let out the 140 Registered Holstein cattle. The barn was destroyed with the milking parlor and a quantity of baled hay. A metal addition, small buildings and the house were saved. The local firemen stood by all day Sunday and helped to change electricity and the place of milking to the other end of the barn. Fire Chief Stanley Murray reported. The men were called back at 11 p. m. and 4 a. m. when fire broke out again. West Greenwood Grangers provided coffee and food for the men.

Greenwood Central School was closed at Noon Tuesday as a memorial to Vaughn Smith who was a Bus Driver for 39 years. Notes were sent home Monday and children who had permission walked to the United Methodist Church with Teachers for a Memorial Service at 10:30 in charge of the Rev. Gerald Wolter and Virgil Hussey. Many Teachers and Bus Drivers attended the funeral in the afternoon at Whitesville. School was closed Wednesday for Veterans' Day.
