In the United States Thanksgiving Day is celebrated the fourth Thursday in November. But this was not always so — it has been official only since 1941. Official or not Thanksgiving Day has been celebrated since the Filgrims first set foot on Plymouth Rock.

After a year of hardship and toil Governor Bradford decreed the first American Thanksgiving — three days of celebration and prayer. This celebration probably grew out of the harvest-home celebrations of their homeland.

During the American Revolution, when the United States was fighting for its existence eight days of thanks were observed. On November 26, 1789 General George Washington declared an official day of thanks. In the same year the protestant Episcopal Church proclaimed the first Thursday in November as a "day for prayer and giving thanks."

Until 1830 there was no official Thanksgiving Day; then New York State established an annual fixed day followed by other northern states. Virginia led the southern states in this same custom in 1855. But even though the states established individual Thanksgiving Days there was now for the entire Days there was none for the entire

nation.

For thirty years Mrs. Sarah
Josepha Hale worked for a national Thanksgiving Day. In 1863 President Lincoln proclaimed "a day of thanksgiving and praise to benefit our father". For the next seventy-five years each president set aside a day of thanksgiving — usually the last Thursday in November. In 1939 President Roosevelt set it one 1939 President Roosevelt set it one week ahead to help Christmas busi-ness. Finally in 1941 Congress voted the last Thursday in November as the legal, federal Thanksgiving Day.

No matter what the date for Thanksgiving Day.

No matter what the date for Thanksgiving Day the American people always have its spirit. This year while we celebrate let's not only laugh with our friends and relatives and gorge ourselves with turkey and pumpkin ple but let's take a few minutes out for prayer. Let's pray for those who' will be spending Thanksgiving in barren unheated shacks. Let's pray for those who would welcome our lettover food scraps as a feast. Let's pray for all the families who won't be united, for the boys in Vietnam. Let's give thanks for being as fortunate as we are and pray we can help those who are less fortunate.
