Solid Wastes Disposal Study Grant Awarded

A grant of \$86,275 has been awarded to Steuben and Allegany counties for a solid wastes disposal study. Governor, Rockefeller has announced.

"Planning for solid wastes dis-posal is not only necessary from an economic point of view, but is also essential to make proper use of resources," Governor Rockefel-

The grant will pay 100 per cent of study costs and is the 18th State-funded grani or this nature to be awarded under Article 13. Title IX of the Public Health Law.

Governor Rockefeller explained Governor Rockefeller explained that the study will cover location; and methods of disposal, transport and collection of trash and garbage, as well as commercial wastes and will result in the development of all reasonable methods of refuse disposal which may be adopted to meet present needs and those over the next 15 years.

"We want to find new and better ways of using our land," Governor Rockefeller-said. "We want to see

that landfill areas are designed from their inteption for use a that landfill areas are designed from their inception for use a parks, golf courses, conservation demonstration areas or other community assets. The want to commine landfill with recycling, insofar as possible, and make multiple use of facilities. This is, the time for imaginative approaches on a sound economic basis."

The study will take 12 months and is designed to hold at wastes disposal practices for the next 15 years. Applicant for the study was the Steuber-Allegary Study Wastes Study Committee chaired by Lee R. Ryan. The Contracting engineering Deciding of Philip

The training will be given under the State Manpower Training Act by the Steuben County Board of

Cooperative Educational Services at Jones Memorial Hospital Wellsville, the Bath Veterans Hospital, Bath and the Bethesda Community Hospital, Hernell.


Each trainee ill receive 35 hours of training a week for 41 weeks.

If you make \$40,000, don't bother to read this item. But if you don't, like most of us, you may get a few helpful hints on how to achieve that affluent status. Become a crane operator. Belong to a tough union that makes fantastic wage demands with the attitude of "Damn everywith the didtude of Daim every-body else! We want ours—and the hell with the rest of the economy!" Build roads for the government. That's all it will take, believe it or not. Because \$40,000 is the going pay scale. Even most doctors, big business executives and university presi-dents, with all their education and professional training, sel-dom reach those ultra-high income heights.

No one objects to raises, as long as the individual's work productivity keeps pace with his scalary increases. But more pay for the same work output only sets off a vicious wage-price spiral that ends in dangerous in-flation. Everything goes up. We're feeling the price pinch now, but can you imagine what it would be like to have costs: pushed so far out of reach that a can of beans would sell for \$2, a pound of meat for \$10? The average American won't be able to touch prices in that category, simply because he doesn't earn

To my mind, it's naked power and greed when union chieftains lead their men—crane operators or others—to demand big wage hikes that will push up prices for the rest of us. It isn't helping the American dollar buy more. And it certaintly isn't enhancing the image of American labor.

Little-known facts about the big "E": Ecology. It's the latest catch-word. You see it and hear it everywhere. Some people are quick to latch on to it and use it as a convenient slogan for denouncing anything connected with changes in our environment presumably caused by indus-trialization. True, technology has surged ahead of man's capacity for controlling the quality of his daily atmosphere. But I wonder if critics fully realize that big companies are now spending fortunes to restore and improve our natural environment? One major organization has helped counteract pollution by equip-ping all of its new motor vehicles (and they have thousands!) with devices that minimize the amount of carbon dioxide in the air. Company incinerators and their annoying smoke are being phased out. The water used in their research projects is "cleansed" before flowing into public waste systems. Another company has developed a new self-destructive pesticide: Once the insects are killed, the pesticide destructive itself leaving no cide destroys itself, leaving no harmful traces. A steel giant is conducting soil research to help grow better food for tomorrow's families. And these are just α few isolated examples of the vast build-up of ecological concern on the part of American indus-try. We can't have our modern civilization without some changes in environment. So let's not fix the blame without know-

ing the facts. It isn't fair or wise.
