## Assemblyman Frank Walkley Reports

Albany — The third and final Assembly mini-session of 1970 was held December 14-15 according to Assemblyman Frank Walkley (R-Castile).

In reporting on the Monday and Tuesday sessions in the Capitol, Assemblyman Walkley also noted that meetings of 16 of the 21 Assembly standing committees were held.

The Assemblyman tells the operation of standing committees year-round is a move in the right direction toward legislative reform. "We will see legislation being introduced in the 1971 legislative session which will be an outgrowth of the work done by the committees," he declared.
