

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order January 8, 1973 by the President Mr. Carl Atwell. Mr. Weibezahl and the following Board Members were present: William Walker, Carl Atwell and Conner Stephens.

The minutes of the previous regular meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by William Walker. Seconded by Conner Stephens and carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's Report was read for approval. Carl Atwell made the motion that the report be accepted as read. William Walker seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria Report was read by Mr. Weibezahl showing a net loss of \$167.00 for the month of December. A motion was made by William Walker to file this report with the minutes. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The bills for the month of December 1972 were certified at \$9,729.09 plus utilities. Conner Stephens made the motion to approve the payment of these and Carl Atwell seconded. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The School Cafeteria bills were certified at \$1,477.66. Approval to pay motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Mr. Weibezahl read the following Article of Recognition regarding teacher negotiation.

Article I — Recognition
The Andover Central School Board of Education, having determined that the Andover Central School Teachers Association is supported by a majority of the teachers in a unit composed of all professional, certificated personnel except the Chief Executive Officer, hereby recognizes the Andover Central School Teachers Association as the exclusive negotiating agent for the teachers in such unit. Such recognition shall extend until one hundred and twenty days prior to the annual meeting date in 1974 and for successive periods of one year thereafter.

The Board agrees not to negotiate with any other teacher organization other than the association for the duration of this Agreement. William Walker moved to adopt the resolution and Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Payroll for the month of December 1972 were read for approval. Carl Atwell made the motion that these be approved as read. William Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The amount was \$42,395.98. Conner Stephens made the motion that the President of the Board of Education Carl Atwell be allowed to borrow \$131,674.26 on a Revenue Anticipation note to be used until State Aid is received the last three months of the school year. April, May and June. Motion seconded by William Walker, Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Mr. William Walker made a motion that a large bus be used for transporting the swim team so that interested spectators can fill the bus seat and attend away swim contests. Seconded by Conner Stephens and passed by 3 votes of yes.

Mr. Carl Atwell recommended that Karen Kopp and Karen Peterson attend a workshop in Individualized Learning Techniques at Rochester on January 25, 1973. Seconded by Conner Stephens, and passed by 3 votes of yes.

In accordance with a directive from the State Education Dept. we have adopted as the legal name for our district Andover Central School District. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Mr. William Walker moved to accept State Auditors report covering July 1, 1969 thru June 30, 1972. Seconded by Conner Stephens, passed by 3 votes of yes.

Walter L. Storms Jr. Killed in One-Car Accident

A 31-year-old Wellsville man, Walter L. Storms, Jr., of 23 S. Main St., was pronounced dead on arrival at the St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell late Monday evening after a one-car accident in the Town of Andover.

He was the first Allegany County traffic fatality in 1973. State police said that Mr. Storms was traveling south on Route 21 about 3 miles north of Andover, when his car apparently left the road, where it traveled a distance of about 250 feet before striking a guide rail.

Investigating troopers reported that the impact broke the auto into two sections, ejecting Mr. Storms from the car. His body was found on a guide rail approximately 60 feet from the point of impact.

The front section of the car landed almost 120 feet from the impact point, and the rear section was found about 100 feet away. Trooper D. G. Vespucci and Sgt. D. L. Snyder and Investigator H. D. Slade investigated the accident.

Mr. Storms was born August 21, 1941, in the village of Andover, a son of Walter and Oletha Callaghan Storms, Sr., who survive. Mr. Storms and his wife, the former Patricia White, of Wellsville, had operated an antique store on Main Street in Wellsville recently. Mr. Storms was employed as a salesman at the time of his death.

In addition to his wife and parents, Mr. Storms is survived by three children, Rebecca, Patrick and Sean, all at home; three daughters, Denae, Renae and Joanne, all of Olean; two sisters, Miss Cheryl Storms of Friendship, Mrs. Larry (Gayle) House of Ohio; and one brother, Neil Storms of Angelica; His maternal grandmother, Mrs. Hazel Callaghan of Andover, and several nieces and nephews survive.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Funeral services will be conducted Thursday at 1 p. m. at the Embser Funeral Home, Wellsville with the Rev. Donald Weaver, pastor of the First United Methodist Church officiating.

Burial will be in Woodlawn Cemetery, Wellsville.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday evening, January 8, 1973. Those present: James Kessler, Mayor; Glenn Thorp, William Dunham, and Ronald Glover. Trustees: Reginald Sootheran, Attorney; Paul Bissell and Randal Belmont.

Minutes of the meeting held December 11, 1972 were read and approved on a motion made by William Dunham and seconded by Ronald Glover. Carried.

The Board was informed by the Clerk that the second and last check for revenue sharing for 1972 was received in the amount of \$2965.00 bringing the total for 1972 to \$6038.00.

Moved by William Dunham and seconded by Glenn Thorp authorizing the Clerk to publish in the Andover News, notice that the Board of Trustees will authorize \$5267.00 in revenue sharing money to be applied to the permanent improvements on Rochambeau Avenue. Polled — Glenn Thorp, Aye — Ronald Glover, Aye — William Dunham, Aye and James Kessler, Aye. Carried.

Moved by Ronald Glover and seconded by William Dunham to pass the attached bond resolution for \$5751.70 at 4% interest from the Citizens National Bank & Trust Co., Andover Office, to be applied to permanent improvements. Polled — Glenn Thorp, Aye; Ronald Glover, Aye; William Dunham, Aye; and James Kessler, Aye. Carried.

Glenn Thorp moved, seconded by Ronald Glover, that the Board of Trustees shall meet at the Village Office on February 20th from 1 to 2 P. M., for the purpose of completing the assessment roll and hearing and determining complaints of any person considering himself aggrieved thereby. Carried.

The following resolution was offered by William Dunham and seconded by Ronald Glover who moved its adoption and it carried unanimously.

WHEREAS The Treasurer will have a list of unpaid taxes on February 1st.
