The Greenwood Town Board recent hearing adopted a Local Law concerning the operation of snowmobiles on Town Roads. Snowmobiles may be operated on the following roads unplowed as authorized by Sec. 25.05 - Sub 5 of the Parks and Recreation Law: Dryden Hill, Fryer Road, North; Devils Kitchen Road, Clansy Road, Brown Hollow Road, Fenton Ave., Erskin Hollow Road, Wheeler Hill Road and O'Hagan Road. The roads are being marked with signs. Snowmobiles may be operated on the shoulders and inside banks of the following plowed roads and streets - Church Hill, Dryden Hill, Fryer Road, Simons Road, Redmond Hill Road, Williamson Road, Town Line Road, Catholic Cemetery Road, Boyd Hill Road, Slate Creek Road, Kelly Road, Norton Hollow Road, Coby Creek Road, Brown Road, Flynn Road, York Road, Krusen Road, Banks Hollow Road.

The Local Law prohibits the operation of snowmobiles on any sidewalks. The Town Parking Lot is to be used for parking of snowmobiles and not for a riding area. No operations on the access routes to and from town after 10 P. M. Sunday through Thursdays and after midnight Friday and Saturday is permitted. Snowmobiles using the access routes are not to exceed the speed of 15 miles perhour. All Streets in the Village of Greenwood, except those assigned as access routes are closed to snowmobiles as are State Routes 248 and 17. All Snowmobiles using Town Roads as designated must be licensed and carry proof of insurance as required by the Parks and Recreation Law. Minors under age 14 are prohibited from riding posted plowed roads unless accompanied by a parent or guardian on a snowmobile.
