## Presbyterian-Methodist Cooperative Parish Approved

If you heard the Church Bells the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches of Andover ringing last Sunday afternoon, January 7th, it was to indicate that the proposal for a Cooperative Parish of the two Churches was approved. Fifty-one members of the Methodist Church and forty-five members of the Presbyterian Church voted and in each case the vote was at least three-fourths of the majority favoring the Cooperative Parish although only a two-thirds vote was required for approval.

Due to some details which need to be worked out — the nominating and electing of a Cooperative Parish Council on Ministries, the preparing and approving of a Parish Budget for financial items in which the two Churches will share responsibility, and the arranging of the Sunday School classes, the Sunday Schools and Worship Services of the Churches will not be actually combined until the first Sunday in February.

Each Church is retaining its own membership, its own Boards of Trustees, Session and Administrative Board who will have general oversight of each Church's responsibilities as well as the combined Council of Ministries which will be amendable to each church's administrative agencies.

A Pastor-Parish Committee has been elected to nominate the Council on Ministries, to nominate a Parish Treasurer, and to prepare the Parish Budget of shared items. Members of this Committee are: Oliver Kemp, Ralph Searle, Doris MacMichael, Glenn Bronson, Alan Tuttle, Roland Kemp, Doris Church and George Brown. Rev. Ray Albaugh, who will also continue to serve the United Methodist Church of Greenwood, N. Y. will be the Pastor for the Cooperative Parish beginning February 1st.

## Aid County Business Firms

Belmont — The Allegany County Economic Development Office, over the past three weeks has contacted 487 county businesses to make sure all businesses sustaining June flood damage have filed for assistance.

Deadline for filing is Jan. 15, the office reminded.

Of the 487 businesses, 160 reported having sustained flood damage, and 95 had already applied for assistance, and were in various stages of the process of receiving assistance.

Thirty-three businesses had sustained flood damage and not yet applied for assistance. In addition, 23 businesses were undecided as to whether to file for assistance.

Along with the businesses that had filed, 33 individuals having real or personal property damaged in the flood have filed for assistance.

It makes a total of 66 or possibly 75 cases of persons making an application for assistance. Assisting the Economic Development Office were the Wellsville Chamber of Commerce, town supervisors, village and town clerks, and civic clubs.

An office spokesman said "We're sure we've overlooked some, but we've done the best we could — This is a last ditch effort to inform people of the cut off date of Jan. 15."

## Southern Tier Expressway Construction To Continue

Definite plans by the State Department of Transportation to award construction contracts this year and in 1974 to close most remaining gaps in the 246-mile Southern Tier Expressway west of Binghamton were described recently by Transportation Commissioner Raymond T. Schuler. The work will be carried out with anticipated Federal funding from the Appalachia Program and State funds for the 1973-74 and 1974-75 State budgets.

Commissioner Schuler gave details of the position outlined by Governor Rockefeller at the Governor's town meeting in Olean recently. "The Governor then stated", Commissioner Schuler said, "that completion of the Southern Tier Expressway has the highest of priorities, as he recognizes the importance of this facility to the economic development of the region."

The Commissioner said "Governor Rockefeller led the way in recognizing the impact that transportation facilities can have in shaping the development of an area. Economic Development Highways and Economic Development Growth Centers are concepts that owe much to his leadership. We certainly could not have brought the Southern Tier Expressway to its present advanced stage without his vision and the legislative support he gained for us."

Turning to specifics, Commissioner Schuler said his Department "has every intention to undertake paving contracts during the next two years on some 48 miles of the expressway in Cattaraugus, Allegany and Steuben Counties where earth-grading contracts have been in progress Appalachia funds, which haven't been available to us this past year for expressway construction, will be our prime source of Federal aid."

The Commissioner also said his Department is actively seeking to establish the expressway route through Corning area "to clear the way for rebuilding because of the extensive flood damage there. Local redevelopment plans will naturally be influenced by the expressway location, so we have departed from DOT policy in giving advance notice of our intended route recommendation to the Federal Highway Administration."

Expressway construction in Chautauqua County, including the planned bridge over Chautauqua Lake, will also proceed "just as quickly as the environmental questions are resolved, plans completed and funds made available," Mr. Schuler indicated.

"Speaking of funds," The Transportation Commissioner said, "I must emphasize that we in DOT will vigorously pursue all sources of Federal aid that can be tapped. We pre-financed many Southern Tier Expressway projects with 100 per cent State funds in fiscal 1969-70 in expectation of Federal reimbursement, making it difficult for us to meet our other statewide commitments in 1971 and 1972. The Southern Tier Expressway has always been and remains a prime high-priority project."

Last year Commissioner Schuler said, the completion of seven contracts west of Binghamton added 37 miles from its western end near Erie, Pa., to the Governor Thomas E. Dewey Thruway at Harriman, near New York City.

With the opening of a 5.3 mile section between Avoca and Bath in Steuben County as promised by Governor Rockefeller at his Olean town meeting, followed by the opening of 9.8 miles between Waverly and Nichols in Tioga County in mid-73, travel will be continuous on the expressway system for 253 miles between Hornell and Harriman. Another 5.6 miles near Olean should also open by mid-73. Expressway sections in the Elmira-Corning area are to be rebuilt or upgraded in future years to provide full control of access.

Travel is now continuous for 27 miles between Salamanca and the Jamestown area, where another 4.7 miles will open on the west by next summer. Only 33 more miles in the entire 384-mile expressway system, Commissioner Schuler said, remain to be placed under contract. This will be done without delay as funds and final plans materialize.
