FIFTH: this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Ronald Glover moved, seconded by Glenn Thorp, that Anna Howland and Pearl Mesler be appointed as Inspectors of Election at an hourly rate of \$1.85.

The following resolution was offered by William Dunham and seconded by Ronald Glover who moved its adoption and was duly carried unanimously:

WHEREAS: a Per Capita Aid Committee has been established by the New York State Conference of Mayors and other Municipal Officials for the purpose of directing an all out, statewide effort to bring about revisions of the State Revenue sharing formula to remove the inequities to the Villages and Towns of this State.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Village of Andover does hereby confirm its full support of the Per Capita Aid committee's efforts to secure Revenue Sharing Equity and against cutbacks in any state aid to local governments; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that this Village of Andover regards such revisions as the number one legislative priority for 1973 and that coupled with that as a top priority is to have the percentage of state income tax devoted to revenue sharing returned from 18% to its original 21% and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the Clerk forward copies of this action to Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, State Assemblyman George T. Farrell, Chairman, Joint Legislative Committee on Laws affecting Local Government, State Senator, and Assemblyman and to the local news media.

Moved by Glenn Thorp and seconded by Ronald Glover to accept the following police report for the month of December: Complaints, 29 — investigations, 25 — Misc. calls and requests, 6 — Accidents, 3 — doors and windows found open, 2 — Total arrests, 24 — of which 18 were traffic and 4 under parks and recreation law — parking summons issued, 5 — courtesy tickets, 9 — property checks, 2 — court appearances, 4 and patrolman Bissell's hours — 51.

Moved by William Dunham and seconded by Glenn Thorp to appoint Randy Belmont and Paul Bissell as temporary part-time patrolmen. Paul Bissell is to work 2 days a week unless specifically authorized by the Board to do otherwise and Randy Belmont is to work as substitute patrolman for not more than one paid day a month. Carried.

Vouchers as per abstract No. 8 of 72/73 were audited and approved for payment in the following amounts — General \$3544.21; Water \$421.38 and Electric \$7571.18.

Vouchers as per abstract No. 3 of the flood account were audited and approved for payment in the amount of \$7770.37.

This concluded the business and the meeting was adjourned.

Estimated Income Tax Deadline For Farmers Nears, IRS Says

Buffalo, N. Y. — Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1972 gross income from farming should file their 1972 declaration of estimated Federal individual income tax and pay the tax by Monday, January 15, 1973, using form 1040-ES.

However, farmers do not have to file a declaration if they file their 1972 tax return and pay all the tax due by March 1, 1973, according to John E. Foley, Buffalo District Director.

Publication 505 "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax" furnishes information on this subject. It is available free at your IRS district office.

Fishermen who expect to receive at least two-thirds of their gross income from fishing follow the same rules as farmers, Mr. Foley said.

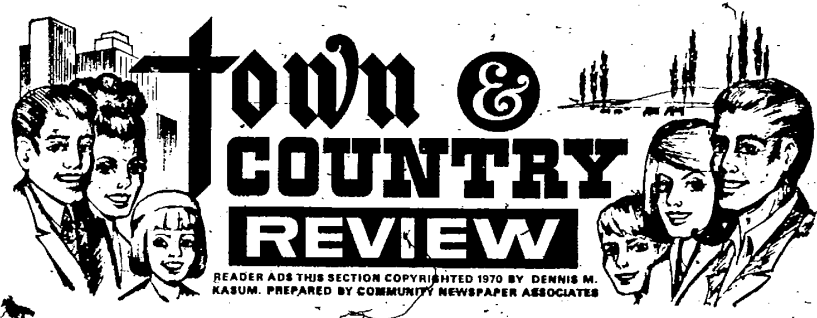
Dear Editor,

I'm writing this primarily as a report on the Youth Fellowship of Andover's recently held "Teen Dance" at the School Gym on December 30th from 8 to 12:00 p.m. It was a ROARING success (at least when I got to bed that night, I knew what the statement, "Silence is Golden" meant.) There were approximately 200 who showed up for the Dance from the Andover and the surrounding towns. The Andover Youth Council with good planning and proper chaperoning were able to have this dance with a minimal amount of problems which were well handled by those who were responsible.

Our Andover Youth, including those who were home for the holidays, are to be congratulated for what I considered well-mannered and controlled behaviour which showed respect and appreciation for being able to have this dance. The "Barge" group which played for the dance, which has a large following in the area, did a good job.
