Farmers Must File Social Security Reports in January

Any farmer who pays an employee cash wages of \$150 or more a year must withhold Social Security taxes and report the annual tax withheld to the Internal Revenue Service by January 31, John E. Foley, Buffalo District Director for Internal Revenue said today.

Farmers must also withhold these taxes on wages under \$150 for any person hired 20 days or

more a year, roley said.


For tax purposes, a farm employer includes anyone who pay workers to perform agricultural iator on his behalf or for someone else. A "crew leader" is an employer under this definition, he added.

Farmers must give a W 2 wage Farmers must give a W 2 wage and tax statement to every worker listed on their Form 943 from whom they withheld both income and Social Security taxes. The IRS prefers that farmers also use a W-2 for those employees listed on Form 943 from whom they withheld only Social Security tax However, they may use Form SS-14 or a written statement containing the Social Security wage and tax information appearing on Form W-2 or SS-14.
