Dog Health Feeding and Care Meeting Jan. 30

The Allegany County 4-H Division is inviting boys and girls with an interest in dogs to attend a Dog Health Feeding and Care meeting on Tuesday, January 30 at 7:30 p. m. at BOCES Center, Belmont. Parents are welcome, too. Dr. George Viharyard, Belmont, will be instructor for the program with Mrs. Homer Doty 4-H Dog Obedience Leader and her dog "Pixie" cooperating in demonstration activities. Any person who owns a dog must realize that the welfare of a living animal is a personal responsibility. There is the need to keep the dog in good health and protect him from disease not only for his sake but for that of other dogs. Only a veterinarian is qualified to diagnose trouble and prescribe treatment but preventive medicine and awareness of signs of illness are the owner's responsibility. How to give a dog liquid medicine or a pill will be shown at this meeting. Relative merits of dry and canned dog food will be considered. The color film "Alaskan Sled Dog" will be shown at the meeting. The adventures of Nip-chik, and Alaskan Eskimo boy, show life in a situation where a dog is not only man's best friend, but a basic necessity for existence. 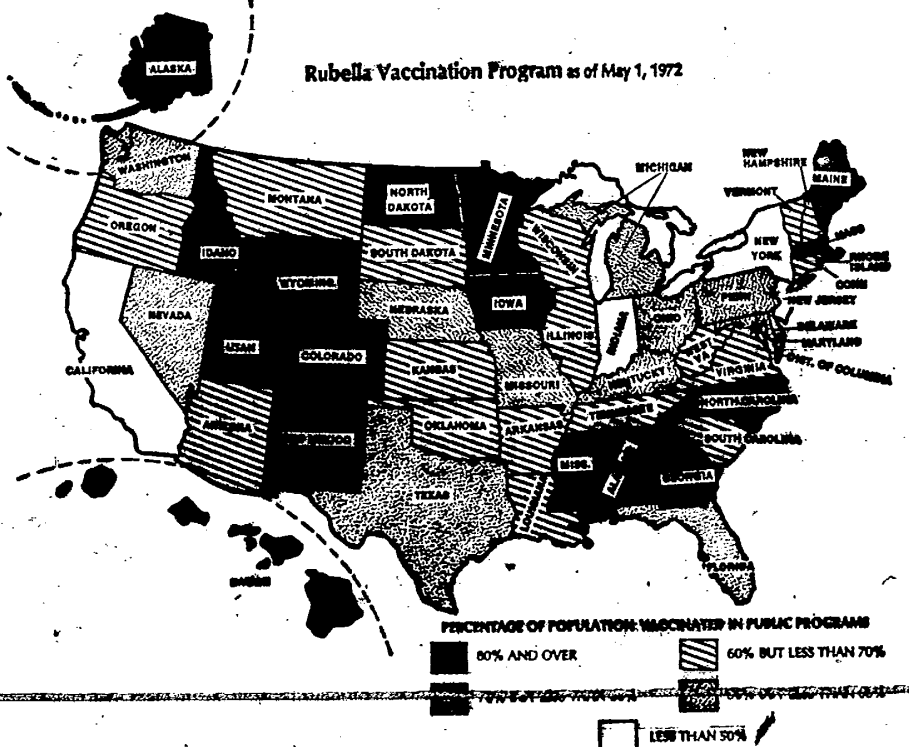

Veterans News

Mr. James J. McLaughlin, State Veteran Counselor, today urged veterans to make and endeavor to keep several New Year's resolutions. These resolutions, he said, maybe of invaluable assistance to the veterans or their families during 1973. "First on the list of resolutions," Mr. McLaughlin stated, "is that veterans and their families keep their military service and family records together in a safe place for easy access in time of need; second, veterans should make sure their GI insurance beneficiary listing is up-to-date; third, veterans or their dependents should notify the VA and the Post Office whenever they plan to move; and fourth, veterans and their families should make a habit of contacting their local State Veteran Counselor for up-to-date information on changing veterans laws and benefits. "Failure to keep these resolutions," the counselor said, "may result in veterans or their families losing out on benefits because they lack certain required documents; failure of a deceased veteran's family to receive his insurance because he failed to change his beneficiary when he married, was divorced or had children; loss of pension or dividend checks because of failure to report changes of address; and, failure to keep abreast of changing veterans laws and benefits may keep a veteran or his family from receiving benefits for which they may be eligible." Veterans and their families are urged to make and keep these resolutions and to visit the local Counseling Center of the New York State Division of Veterans Affairs located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville on Tuesdays and at the City Bldg., Hornell, on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays for up-to-date information and counseling on all veterans benefits.
