After a wedding trip to Florida, the couple will reside at R. D. 2, Andover, N. Y.

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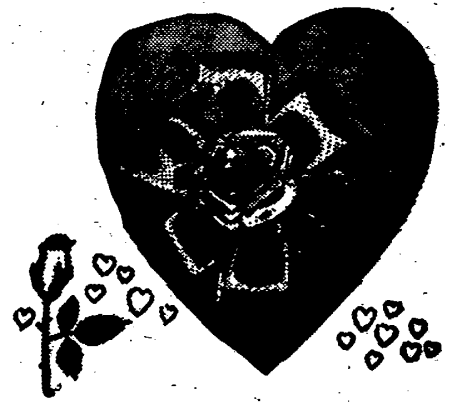
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
