Supreme Court Justice Alton J. Wightman reserved decisions on motions Friday after testimony ended in the case of former Greenwood Central School teacher seeking a tenured position with the Steuben-Allegany County Board of Cooperative Educational Services. Testifying were the petitioner George A. Angello of Greenwood, Charles Wright, Supervising Principal of the Greenwood Central School, and Joseph Schneider, Director of BOCES Vocational Educa-

tion and Edward M. Tomkins, Assistant District Superintendent. The case tests a State Education Law which became effective April 25, 1972 providing that where a program of a school district is taken over by BOCES, a teacher in the district program shall become a BOCES employee entitled to all tenure rights.

Both attorneys were given 20 days after receiving trial transcripts to submit further memoranda. They are to advise Justice Wightman by Wednesday whether their clients will order and share the cost of transcripts.
