

**GREENWOOD NEWS**

The Greenwood Fire Department and Ambulance Corp are now the proud possessors of one of the newest and most complete ambulances in Western New York, only Baldwinsville and Elmira have like vehicles. The new \$16,000 white and orange vehicle built by Superior Coach Co. of Rochester, was delivered Tuesday afternoon, within an hour of two runs made by ambulance squad members. Charles Wright and Clinton York were called out to take the 18 month old Robert Studer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Studer of Church Hill, to the St. James Mercy Hospital. He had burns on his face and head after falling on the floor furnace in his home. Mrs. Studer carried the child to the Fire Hall phone to call for help and were soon rushed to Hornell and medical care. He was transferred to the Burn Center at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester by a Hornell Ambulance. Wright said the Greenwood ambulance did not have the needed suction equipment or oxygen supply for the longer trip.

The new ambulance has a larger oxygen supply with a flow meter and suction devices. There are also two smaller oxygen units that can be taken into a home if needed.

While the men were at the St. James Mercy Hospital, another Corpsman Stanley Murray, brought Velma Krusen of Christian Hollow Road to the hospital in his private car. Ronald Putnam said that is only the second or third time there has been two calls nearly the same time.

The men came back home to take delivery and check out the new ambulance and take it out on practice runs. The Corp serves the Township of Greenwood and contracts with the Town of West Union to serve the eastern half of that Township (the other half being served by Whitesville).

All the Firemen are qualified to drive the ambulance, having taken the necessary First Aid Instructions. Fourteen men have taken the emergency medical technician course offered at Alfred State College. At least two men answer each call and if there is an accident or heart call three men will answer. It is an all man Corp.

The men clean out the ambulance after each run. Each Monday night the men meet at the Hall and clean and give maintenance checks to the ambulance and fire engines. The ambulance is white with orange marking and carries the name Greenwood on the sides and back. The colors and specifications meet new Federal Standards, Captain Putnam said. The ambulance is about 18 inches wider than the old one, giving room for two cots or room for a cot and squad bench and room for an attendant to work. Four stretchers can be carried if necessary. There are backboards making it possible to transport persons with spinal injury. The ambulance is six conditioned, both in the van and the cab. There are gutter lights at the top of each side which can be used to illuminate an accident scene. There is a siren system and a two-way radio. The roof is raised to permit Corpsmen to stand upright while tending persons.

\$7,000 was raised last summer when the Firemen hosted Steuben County Firemen's Convention. As Putnam said they are now better prepared for emergencies. And York said "when you live this far from a doctor you need the best equipment to get to medical help". Why do they spend so much volunteer time, Wright said "someone has to do it".

It was learned the Studer baby hit a live electric cord. He was found unconscious on the furnace by his mother, who had been in another room. His burns were on back, back of his head and each side as he may have turned. He was in serious condition.

There will be two games at the Benefit Game for Clidney McNeill. At 7 P. M., the Greenwood and Whitesville 7th and 8th Grade boys will play the opening game. Then the Rexville and Greenwood Firemen will play in surprise costumes. It will be a real event you won't want to miss. Refresh-


