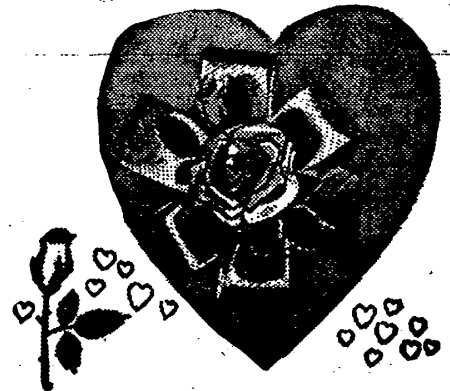
Andover Free Library also loaned on Interlibrary Loan to S.T.L.S. 118 books.
