World Day of Prayer

The World Day of Prayer will be held March 2, 1973 at 7:30 p. m. in the Presbyterian Church. Women of the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Catholic Churches will take part.

The small group of women who first initiated World Day of Prayer in 1887 firmly believed that the Mission Work for which they were responsible needed their support in prayer as much as in giving. This small group was praying FOR the World — today the movement has become international and Christian Women are praying WITH other Christians throughout the whole World.

World Day of Prayer is truly ecumenical as well as international. It is the most widely observed celebration sponsored by church women united — the movement through which Protestant, Roman Catholic and Orthodox women manifested their unity through

fellowship, study and cooperative action.

World Day of Prayer observances are planned by an international committee. The Worship services are prepared each year by women from different parts of the World. The 1973 service was written by women of New Zealand and is adopted by each country for its own use. The women of New Zealand explain the theme "Alert In Our Time" through their expression of these concerns. The theme of the 1973 Prayer Observance "Alert In Our Times" expresses the intention of women to be aware of the crucial needs in the World and to be agents of God's reconciling love in those areas.

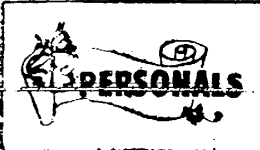

Tax Filing Deadline Nears For Farmers & Fishermen

Farmers and Fishermen who did not file a declaration of estimated Federal individual income tax by January 15, may have a tax deadline of March 1.

John E. Foley, Buffalo District Director, of Internal Revenue said today that if you earned at least two-thirds of your 1972 gross income from farming or fishing, but did not file an estimate by January 15, you must file your 1972 Federal income tax return and pay any tax due by Thursday, March 1, 1973 to avoid penalty for underpayment of estimated tax.
