Conservation Workshop

Four one-week resident workshops on environmental concerns will be conducted for teenagers this summer at Rogers Environmental Education Center, in Sherburne according to an announcement by Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of Environmental Conservation. The workshops are designed to acquaint high school students, both boys and girls, with the major environmental problems confronting society today.

Workshop participants will be introduced to and encouraged to study the complexities of the natural world. Particular emphasis will be placed on the responsibilities of young people as future citizens, including organizations and activities where their efforts may be most effectively applied to help the environment.

Youngsters 13 and 14 years of age may attend workshops either July 8 - 14 or July 15 - 21. Boys and girls 15 and 16 may attend a workshop either July 22 - 28 or July 29 - August 4.

Information and applications are available from Mr. Lauren Vredenburg, Rogers Environmental Education Center, Sherburne, N. Y. 13460. The telephone numbers are (607) 674-2861 and (607) 967-4958.

Candidates will be selected from applications received by April 6 and those accepted will be notified no later than April 20. Applications should be accompanied by a brief personal history of candidates' commitments and future aspirations in the area of the environment. The fee for each one-week workshop is \$50 per person, which includes food and lodging. Successful applicants must remit this fee by May 8. Checks or money orders, made payable to Mid-York Conservation Fund, Inc., should be sent to Rogers Environmental Education Center, Box Q, Sherburne, N. Y. 13460.

Candidates to attend these workshops should be chosen by sportsmen's organizations, civic clubs or professional societies on the bases of the student's prior interest and involvement in environmental or ecological programs.

Welfare Recipients To Undergo Face-To-Face Interviews

All public welfare recipients, effective July 1, will be required to undergo face-to-face interviews at specified intervals to reestablish continued eligibility. Governor Rockefeller has announced.

The requirement, he said, represents a major change in State policy prompted by one of the findings in the first State-operated audit of the welfare caseload.

Preliminary analysis of the audit, the Governor said in releasing an interim report on it by Social Services Commissioner Abe Lavine, disclosed that \$116 million was improperly spent by local welfare districts for ineligibility and overpayments during the audit period — July 1 to December 31, 1972. The total of misspent monies consisted of \$58 million in Federal, \$29 million State and \$29 million in local funds.

"The demonstrated effectiveness of the Department's professional audit team," the Governor said, "will stand as a model for the kind of action that must be taken to attack the problems that have developed in the administration of welfare at all levels of government."

"Commissioner Lavine's quick action to attack the major causes of errors in eligibility and overpayment uncovered by this audit has once again demonstrated his firm resolve to upgrade the welfare system and thus restore public confidence in its administration."

Internal Revenue Service News

An estimated 1,234,238 taxpayers throughout the Buffalo District are due refunds on their Federal tax returns were asked today by Mr. John E. Foley, Buffalo District Director of Internal Revenue to file as soon as possible.

Director Foley revealed the Internal Revenue Service anticipates these taxpayers are due an estimated \$303,463,514. He said the IRS is anxious to not only return the refund money but seeks to reduce processing costs at the Internal Revenue Service Center Andover Mass. through an early filing program.

Director Foley pointed out taxpayers who file their refund returns now will receive their checks long before the April 17 deadline. He asks taxpayers to use the pre-addressed name label and self-addressed envelope that came with their package.

One of the important things on the return this year Mr. Foley advised taxpayers is the revenue sharing questions. Failure to answer them could deprive local communities of much needed Federal Revenue Sharing he warned.
