New Regulations For Grocery Ads Effective February 8, 1973

One consumer dilemma should be lessened under new action taken last month by Agriculture and Markets Commissioner Frank Walkley.

The commissioner recently signed department rules and regulations regarding the advertising of food products when the advertiser lacks sufficient supplies of the item. Mispricing of items is also covered.

The new regulations became effective February 8.

The regulations make it illegal to offer for retail sale, any food or food product at a stated price if the establishment does not have such products in stock and readily available for sale to customers. Advertisements must disclose all exceptions, limitations.

The regulations also prohibit the mispricing of advertised food items. Food will now have to be conspicuously and readily available for sale at or below the advertised price unless there is a

disclosure in the advertisements for all exceptions, limitations or restrictions.

Circumstances sometimes do prevent retailers from making the food available according to their advertisements. The rules and regulations spell out how the retailer can show that those "circumstances" were beyond his control.

Commissioner Walkley said at the signing that "this action was taken to follow the Federal Trade Commission's Trade Regulation Rule on Retail Food Store Advertising and Marketing Practices".

A hearing was held in Albany last September for anyone to voice his opinion on the then proposed regulations. It was attended by representatives of the food industry in the state.

Iroquois Telephone Corp. Rates — Hornell Hearing

Albany, Feb. 26 — The Public Service Commission will hold a hearing late next month in Hornell in its proceeding to determine how much, if any, of a \$465,098 annual rate increase sought by the Iroquois Telephone Corporation is justified.

The Hornell hearing will begin at 10:00 A. M., Thursday, March 29, in the Steuben County Court House. Examiner Bernard I. Feehey will conduct the hearing.

One hearing on the company's rate application already has been conducted in Albany. The higher rates proposed by the company have been suspended — in effect, freezing present rates in force — pending a determination by the Commission. The suspension period may be continued until December 4.

Iroquois provides telephone service to about 18,350 customers in nine separate areas, through 21 dial exchanges. The company's service areas extend from the Oswego area to near Niagara Falls and from Lake Ontario into the Southern Tier, comprising parts of 15 counties.

The increases proposed by Iroquois vary from zero for telephone service and mileage to 271.8 percent for construction, restoration and connection charges. The dollar value of the latter proposal is \$37,962. Iroquois proposes to obtain about \$320,000 additional annual revenue from a 32.1 percent increase in its local exchange service rates.

Tree Seedlings Now Available

For more than 25 years, Department of Environmental Conservation nurseries have made available tree seedlings for public distribution, thereby adding impetus to many environmental practices. In more recent years, shrubs specifically chosen for wildlife food and cover have been incorporated into the nursery program. 1973 planting inventory was set at 13,225,000 seedlings.

According to Julius J. Eckert, Regional Forester with the Department of Environmental Conservation in Jamestown, wildlife shrubs have been unusually popular this year. Only two species remain available, and these are in short supply. Multiflora Rose and Coralberry still number about 500,000 seedlings. Mr. Eckert noted that an adequate number of forest tree seedlings remain.

Due to the magnitude of the forest nursery program, orders are processed through winter months and seedlings are made ready to reach purchaser for spring plant-

This Is What Andover Needs!

A grant of \$4.5 million in Federal funds to the New York Office of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service for repair of streams damaged by Hurricane Agnes last year has been announced by Governor Rockefeller.

The funds, he said, have been made available through a supplemental appropriation by Congress under the Flood Control Act of 1950.

They could be used to install emergency measures necessary to retard water runoff and to prevent erosion. Such action would be limited, however, to areas in which it is needed to safeguard lives and property in a watershed where natural elements have caused sudden impairment in the watershed.

Permissible work under the grant would include (1) seeding to obtain quick vegetative cover on denuded land; (2) sloping of streambanks, if needed, for establishing cover; (3) opening of channels where stream flow is dangerously restricted by sediment and other debris, and (4) constructing protective diversions.

The emergency program is designed to bring severely damaged streams back to their pre-storm condition, not to provide channels and other measures necessary to prevent future floods.

County governments will serve in most cases as sponsors for projects and will obtain permits from private landowners for needed construction. Up to 100 percent of such costs for restoration will be borne by the Soil Conservation Service.

Mr. Eckert advised that waiting until spring to submit an order often finds the supply exhausted. He encouraged early orders.
