Greenwood Central School Board of Education has set April 16 for a referendum on a \$100,000 renovation program to the school buildings. A public information meeting will be held at the school either April 4 or 10 to explain the project. Elmira Architects presented plans for the project. It includes repairs to the roof and capping, bus garage repairs, replacement of windows on the west side of the building, replacement of 12 lighted exit signs and work on the stairs, walk and terrace outside the school. It also includes a new fuel and a 52 gallon water booster tank for the dishwasher.

Board President, Charles Smith and members Ronald Putnam and John Driscoll and Supervising Principal Charles Wright went to Albany March 18 - 20 with members of the Canisteo Board to discuss annexation of the Greenwood District to Canisteo, with the Education Department.

The Board approved the Senior Class Trip April 23 - 27 to be made with twenty Seniors. Chaperons will be Mr. and Mrs. Seymour Heckman, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Halsey and Miss Marriane Wadek. The bus driver will be Glenn Stephens.

The evaluation of the Cafeteria and School Lunch Program by State Officials was reviewed. The Cafeteria and program received a "good" score and several recommendations were made.

Miss Irene McGrath, was a high School English Teacher at Greenwood Central School until her employment was terminated by the Board at its February 12 meeting. Two improper practice charges and a petition to Education Commissioner Ewald Nyquist for relief was served on the District March 2, made public at the meeting last week. John B. Schamel of Elmira, Executive Director of the Elmira Regional Service Center of the State United Teachers Association, said one charge was withdrawn. The reffiling gives the Board 20 days from March 13 to answer the charges. She asks for relief against charges which would include reinstatement.
