Dr. Orlando presented an overall picture of the origins of the Special Education Program pointing out that it was not conceived with the child originally but simply set up as a program to relieve the classroom teachers.

Later the focus changed to aid the child in assisting him in his social adjustments and self concept.

Dr. Orlando indicated that in many ways Allegany County was ahead in its attempts through the Center, in keeping the child in regular classrooms and assisting him in being accepted by his peers. This "Self-ego" image is an important factor in a child's behavior.

Hunger and poor nutrition are frequently causes in a child's inattentiveness in class. An ill-fed child cannot give the proper attention needed.

A Question and Answer period followed Dr. Orlando's presentation.
