Lee R. Ryan Announces His Bid For Re-election

Lee R. Ryan of 84 Main Street, Almond, has announced his bid for re-election as Allegany County Legislator from District 5. This includes the townships of Alfred, Almond, Amity, Andover, Burns, Ward and West Almond.

Ryan served as assessor for four years in the Town of Almond, also town justice for two years before being elected to the first Board of Legislators in Allegany County in 1969. During 1971 he served as minority leader of the Democrat Legislators and has been serving in that capacity this year.

He currently is serving as acting chairman of the planning and historical committee, member of the highway, public health, ways and means and finance, and rules committee.

Ryan is chairman of the Allegany-Steuben Solid Waste Committee which is nearing completion of their study. He is chairman of the advisory committee to the Public Health nurses. He also is a member of the Inter-County committee representing Allegany County, and is a member of the Allegany County Comprehensive Health Committee and is their representative on the project appraisal committee.

Ryan is a member of the Almond Union of Churches, a charter member of the Almond Lions Club and a member of the Almond Grange. Formerly a dairy farmer and active in Farm Bureau, he is currently employed as a stationary engineer at SUNY Ag-Tech at Alfred. Ryan is a veteran of World War II where he served with the Navy.

When asked what he thought were some of the important issues coming up, he said he looked for planning for the changes that will come about as the result of the completion of the Southern Tier Expressway. Also, he stated he was very interested in getting Federal help for long-range flood programs in the county, and implementation of the disposal part of the Solid Waste study. "I certainly am very interested in our county, and look forward to serving District 5 if elected," Ryan said.
