JACK NICKLAUS PLAYS FOR FISHERY RESEARCH

Those of us plugging away for more fishery research to improve the fishing in New York State and throughout the U. S. were encouraged to hear we'd finally hit the big time.

Golf's reigning superstar Jack Nicklaus, along with Boobe Hope, Billy Casper, and Julius Boros, will take part in a special golf exhibition this spring for the benefit of the Sport Fishery Research Foundation. Location of the golf fishing benefit is Marco Island, Florida, one of the most famous sport fishing hot spots on this continent.

More important than the actual money raised to carry out fisheries studies, will be the public attention directed toward aquatic research. The State Department of Environmental Conservation has some great ideas for investigating the re-introduction of landlocked and Atlantic salmon. But there just isn't the money or public interest to carry out these kinds of projects. If we have to play golf to get the show on the road then by all means let's support bigger and better golf benefits.

It's also nice to know that the golfers are fishermen. Nicklaus is Chairman of the Advisory Board of the Foundation, and an avid angler. Hope, Boros, and Casper are also on the Board, and are

known to wet a line at every opportunity. Additional celebrities will be present for the fishing part of the program, including Joe Garagiola, Ted Williams and Earl Morall.

Spectators will be eligible to fish against the "pros" for snook, tarpan, sea trout, red fish, and large mouth bass. Anyone taking larger fish than the personalities in these categories will receive awards.

The Sport Fishery Research Foundation employs no salaried personnel, only volunteers. The scientific management of the Foundation and its administrative overhead is contributed at no cost by the cooperating Sport Fishery Institute.

Dr. Jay Harmic, a marine biologist and director of research at the Marco Island marine ecology station, has nothing but praise for the Foundation.

"These are dedicated people and they are on the right track", Harmic says. "The Foundation has done a lot for the fishery biologists as well as the sport fishermen in general. They're doing everything they can to help sport fishing."

Holland - Perry Speedway News

Holland International and Perry Motor Speedway, the USA Tracks of Western New York, held their first annual NASCAR registration night Tuesday evening, at the American Legion Post in Holland.

Over three hundred racing enthusiasts turned out for the annual affair, with over two hundred competitors joining the NASCAR fold, sanction body for events held at USA Tracks for 1973. A total of sixty-three racing machines for the three competitive divisions which will compete at the two new NASCAR Tracks were registered.

A nine year veteran returning to the paved ovals is five time champion Art Clark of West Seneca, New York. Art has the distinction of being the only driver in USA Track's history to capture two championships, in separate divisions, in the same season! Truly, an extraordinary feat.

Clark claims still another title as the only competitor to return to these Tracks as a former NASCAR champion. Art claimed the NASCAR B-modified title in 1967 on dirt in a Chevy powered machine. Ironically, however, this was the last year for dirt on the USA Tracks and was also the final championship Clark has collected since that time.

Clark switched to MoPor power and although finishing runnerup several times in the past few seasons, his decision to switch back to a Chevy powered Camero for 1973 was dominated by the successful 1972 finish in his arch-rival Dick Flaig's camero.

The largest field of late model and limited sportsman, plus charger cars, are expected for practice and time trials at Holland International on April 21st as well as opening day, April 28th, plus practice at Perry Motor Speedway on the 29th and the opening on the 6th of May.

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
