Greenwood Central School Board of Education heard a report Monday night from seven elementary teachers on a coordination planning session March 22 and workshops on Teaching Methods. The report was presented by Mrs. Virginia York, Elementary Coordinator. Mrs. Kathleen O'Hargan, 2nd Grade, Mrs. June Rollins, 3rd Grade, Miss Marianne Wadek, 6th Grade, Mrs. Ann Zuschin, 5th Grade, Mrs. Shirley Cook, 4th Grade and Miss Marcella Fairfield, Kindergarten Teacher. Transparencies were made and are available to all Teachers.

A report was made on the workshop held in Canisteo on Departmentalization and on the workshop on individualized instruction held in Arkport. The teachers suggested partial departmentalization with half of each school day spent in regular grade classroom for basic instruction. Questions raised were: overlapping of instruction, personality conflicts, staffing and professional ethics. The Board directed the teachers to work out a proposed program to present it to the Board for further consideration.

The Board accepted the bid of Paul Poole of Greenville, S. C., for \$678.78 for the purchase of a 1963 thirty passenger school bus.

The request from the Sophomore Class to have a school dance was approved to earn money for the Washington Trip in their Senior year.

The Board voted to participate in Phase I of the Instructional Television Program which is expected to be implemented in the County by July of this year. It is a three year program and is funded 80 per cent by the State and Federal funds and will cost the District 45 cents per pupil.

A bid of \$1,050 for the purchase of a Wurlitzer organ from Fletchers in Hornell, was approved.

A concert will be scheduled by the PTA with the proceeds going towards the purchase of the organ.

Mrs. Anne Zuschin's resignation as Fifth Grade Teacher was accepted. Tenure was granted to Mrs. Margaret Murray and Mrs. Jean Harrington.

An informal meeting of the Board and Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Richard McDonald will be held April 19. The proposed annexation with Canisteo Central School will be discussed.

Supervising Principal Charles Wright was in Syracuse Wednesday to answer charges filed by Miss Irene McGrath, former teacher at Greenwood, with the Public Employees Relation Board. A hearing was held April 24 before Education Commissioner Oswald Nyquist for reinstatement to the Faculty.

A special district meeting was held at 8 p. m., Monday, April 16 for taxpayers to vote on the project. Board President Charles Smith was chairman of the meeting.
