HOLLAND - PERRY (USA) TRACKS PREPARE FOR OPENERS

February and March have come and gone. What will April bring? It will bring a brand new organization to the Western New York area called the United Speedway Associates, Inc., consisting of Holland International and Parity Motor Speedways. The Western New York USA tracks held their first annual NASCAR Registration night last week, with host Pete Keller, NASCAR Technical Dir-ector for the Modified and Late

ector for the Modified and Late Model Sportsman Divisions.

A total of over 300 enthusiasts turned out for the first annual affair, with more than half joining the NASCAR fold, sanctioning body for events held at USA tracks for 1973. A sum of 63 racing machines for the three competitive divisions were registered to comdivisions were registered to com-pete at the two new NASCAR tracks.
