#### The True Meaning of Easter

Ostara, or Eostre, was the Goddess of spring in the religion of the ancient Angles and Saxons. Every April a festival was celebrated in her honor. With the beginning of Christianity, the old gods were put aside. From then on the festival was celebrated in honor of the resurrection of Christ, but was still known as Easter after the old Goddess.

Easter does not fall on the same date each year, but is determined by certain calendar rules. Jesus Christ was crucified on the day marking the feast of the Jewish Passover, and His resurrection occurred on the third day after his death. Early Christians attempted to celebrate Easter every year on the actual anniversary of this date. The Jewish calendar could not be made to agree with the Roman calendar which came later. As a result the Christians finally determined at the Council of Nicaea in A. D. 325 to fix Easter day as the first Sunday after the full moon that comes either on or next after March 21 - the vernal equinox. If the full moon falls on Sunday, Easter is celebrated the following Sunday. The date of the full moon which decides Easter is figured according to certain calendar rules and may differ slightly from the actual or astronomical date of the full moon. This method of reckoning the date for Easter was finally accepted by all Christians of Western Europe, and is still followed by them.

Members of the Eastern Orthodox Church, however, reckon according to the Julian, rather than the Gregorian Calendar. They do not celebrate Easter before or on the date of the Jewish Passover. The dates of all church festivals which have no calendar date are reckoned from the date of Easter.

This Easter Sunday, let's all think about the true meaning of Easter.

Monday, April 23
