Disease Resistance In Cucumbers Cited For Home Gardeners

Home gardeners can control cucumber diseases without using chemical sprays if they plant varieties with built-in natural disease resistance, says a Cornell University specialist. Prof. Raymond Sheldrake Jr., of the Department of Vegetable Crops at the N. Y. State College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, Cornell, advises gardeners to avoid old-time varieties and look for disease resistant ones.

"Plant breeders are constantly breeding disease resistance into vegetable crops", he says. For example cucumber mosaic virus is a deadly plant disease for cucumbers.

"The only way to escape it is to us mosaic-resistant varieties", he stresses.

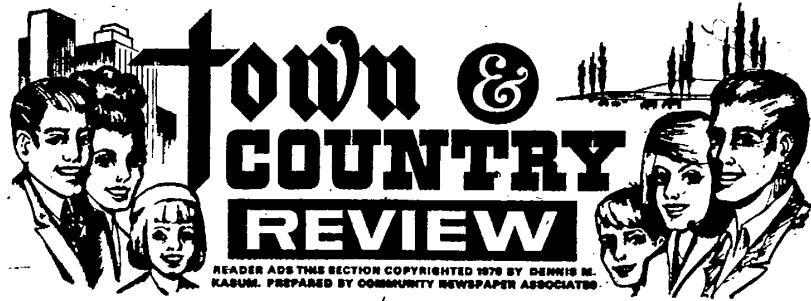
Three Cornell varieties — Meridian, Marketmore 70, and Tablegreen 65 — not only resist this disease but also resist scab, another serious cucumber malady.

BUI has resistance to this viral disease, also. Gemini, which has tolerance to several cucumber diseases, seems to do quite well. Sheldrake says.

"For real resistance to the dreaded cucumber mosaic virus, I'd give Meridian, Marketmore 70, Belair, or Tablegreen 65 a try".

"Remember, however, they will still need to be sprayed for insect control because we do not have insect-resistant cucumbers".
