Allegany County Senior Citizens Informational Center reports the following 3 months service to the elderly of Allegany County. The Center, and its 20 Volunteer Phone Centers throughout the county have been called upon for assistance in a wide variety of categories. The needs have been met in the following major service areas of information and referral:

- Employment — 21
- Health — 14
- Rent-Housing — 4
- Personal — 386
- Social Security and Medicare — 14
- Social Service and Medicaid — 4
- Transportation — 268
- Miscellaneous — 151

This makes a total of 862 problems. The reassurance calls for the same period of time comes to a total of 1684.

The Bolivar Girl Scouts have adopted 54 elderly residents and are visiting or sending them cards.

A Wellsville Brownie Troop of several girls have an adopted Grandmother who just loves them to visit and is less lonesome now because of them.

The Center has one volunteer who does not want to be publically identified, who cares for several elderly in her neighborhood. She calls it a labor of love.

The burden of daily living has been eased for a 90 year old lady in the Belfast area because one of our Volunteers cares and is responding to her needs.

In Amond, six Volunteers served 74 needs for 36 aging residents. One other Volunteer in the county expresses her feelings and why she does so much by saying — "Happiness is — Loving the Aged."

The Informational Center is always looking for new Volunteers to especially assist in reassurance calls and aid in transportation, at their convenience. As there is no public conveyance available in our County, it is very difficult for many to get to and from their necessary appointments. Another especially great need is for people willing to work daily or for live-in care, either for short term or on a permanent basis, and usually for pay. The demands exceed the work force available. Lions Clubs Achieve One Million Members



OAK BROOK, ILLINOIS — Bernard A. "Barney" Gill (left), of Virginia Beach, Va., has been recognized as the one millionth member of the International Association of Lions Clubs, according to Lions President George Friedrichs, Anney, France, Lions International is the world's largest service organization with more than 26,000 clubs in 148 countries and geographical territories around the world. It is the first service association to reach one million members. In special ceremonies conducted at the Association's Oak Brook, Ill., headquarters, Gill received a special plaque from Phil W. Sterker, of Basalt, Colo., Chairman of the Membership Club Service Committee of the International Board of Directors.

Gill, 45, a retired Army Lieutenant Colonel and Viet Nam veteran, is Executive Director of the United Drug Abuse Council, Inc., a planning and coordinating agency for all drug related problems in the Tidewater region of Virginia. He resides in Virginia Beach with his wife, Nancy, and their five children, and is a member of the Virginia Beach Oceanfront Lions Club.
