Andover Teacher Wins Legal Case On Tenure

A landmark decision regarding the definition of teacher tenure was upheld Thursday in Albany by the Appellate Division, State Supreme Court, in the case of a Richburg Central School teacher.

The appellate justices ruled that Mrs. Elizabeth M. Lynch should be reinstated as a teacher at Richburg Central. In doing so it upheld an earlier ruling by State Supreme Court.

Mrs. Lynch, a Latin teacher for seven years, was dismissed in 1972 when the Latin program was abolished because of decreasing demands for the subject.

She had also taught English and social studies at the school but was certified to teach only Latin.

Her dismissal was fought by the New York State United Teachers (NYSUT). It took the position that Mrs. Lynch had tenure as a secondary school teacher, not as a Latin teacher, and that she therefore should be allowed to fill an English vacancy that was available at the time.

Her dismissal by the Board of Education was appealed to the state education commissioner, but he rejected it. It was appealed to State Supreme Court in Albany which ruled in her favor.

The Board of Education then appealed to the Appellate Division which has now upheld Supreme Court Justice George L. Cobb's decision of last July.

That decision, set down the "first instance", or landmark decision, that tenure is based not on subject areas but on grade levels — kindergarten, elementary school, secondary school, and special learning areas such as home economics, physical education and occupational education.

Mrs. Lynch attended Summer School to meet the qualifications of the New York State Department of Education for the position in the English Department and was fully qualified to teach in the position in question.
