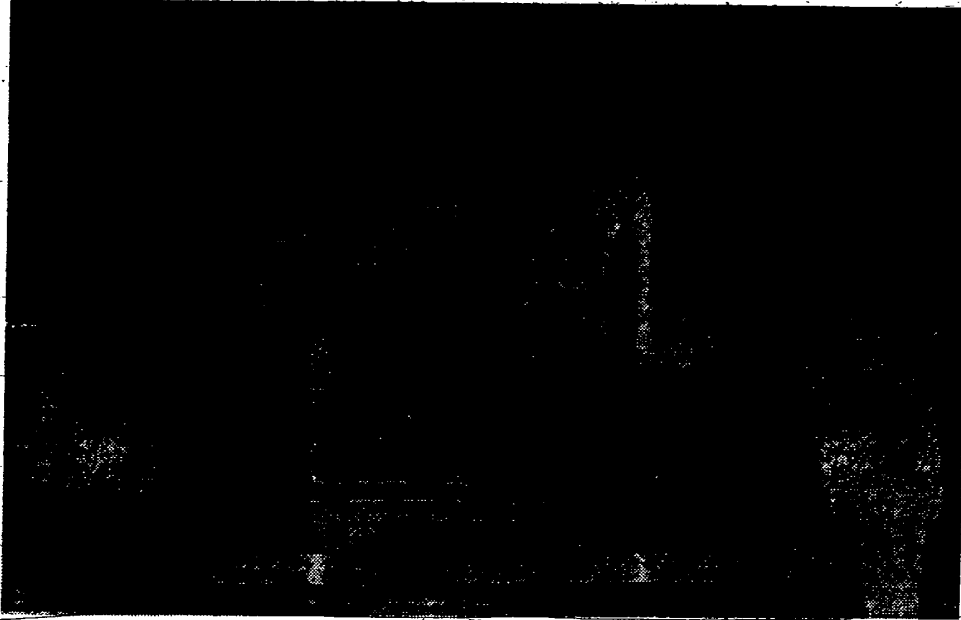

Memorial Day Plans Announced For May 28th

Residents of Andover are cordially invited to attend and participate in Memorial Day Services on Monday, May 28th, sponsored by Lynch-Burgett Post No. 397 of The American Legion, Post Commander Leo Burgett, announced today.

The parade, led by the Legion Color Guard and Legion Band will form on Main Street, in front of the Legion Building, Monday, Memorial Morning at 9:45 A. M., and will move promptly at 10:00 A. M.

The parade will move North on Main Street, then East on Elm Street, where they will be joined by the Andover Central School Band and students with flags, going South on East Ave, West on Greenwood Street to Main Street, to Hillside Cemetery, where the following program will be held:

Introduction, Leo Burgett, Legion Commander
Prayer, Malter Gath, Chaplain
"In Flanders Field", Susan Church
"Gettysburg Address", Tom McMichael
Memorial Day Address, by Rev. Ray Albaugh
Salute to the Dead, Legion Firing Squad
Taps
The procession will re-form and proceed to the Legion Park where the flag will be raised from half mast.

Memorial Observance. If the uniform doesn't fit — come out and march anyway.

Memorial Day observances have been a part of the American scene for more than 100 years, Commander Leo Burgett, explained. In 1868, Gen. John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic issued his historic order for such an observance which established the tradition of public ceremonies "to respect comrades who died in defense of their country."

For many years after the Civil War, the GAR in the North and the Confederate Veterans in the South took charge of Memorial Day services in their respective communities. When these organizations became unable to carry on actively these rites (which include the decoration of all known veteran grave sites) The American Legion pledged its help to the perpetuation of the annual observance of Memorial Day, Commander Burgett explained.

Although it began as an occasion to commemorate the dead of all wars, Memorial Day has since become a time for the decoration of graves of family and friends.

In urging the widest possible participation by Andover residents in Memorial Day services Commander Burgett referred to the following excerpt from General Logan's original order for the observance of Memorial Day:

"Let no avarice or neglect, no ravages of time testify to present or coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic"

In issuing an official proclamation for the observance of Memorial Day, Mayor Bliss has called upon every household and business firm in Andover to display the United States Flag in solemn tribute to the meaning of the day.

"Lazy Eye Clinic" To Be Held June 2

The Andover Lions Club in cooperation with the Allegany Public Health Nursing Service is conducting its annual Pre-School Vision Screening Clinic. The purpose of this Clinic is to detect Amblyopia or Lazy Eye in children before they start school.

Amblyopia commonly called "Lazy Eye" is a rather common functional eye disorder in young children. With this condition one eye sees sharply and the other sees poorly. In many cases this problem can be corrected if detected and treated before he reaches school age.

Note: 1. Once the child reaches school age the chances for correcting the problem are greatly reduced.

2. This problem of "Lazy Eye" will NOT correct itself.

Bring your pre-schoolers age 3 1/2 to 5 years to the FREE Clinic on Saturday June 2, 1973 from 9:00 A. M. to 11:00 A. M. to the Andover Central School Cafeteria.
