Departmentalization of grades four through seven for a year's trial was approved by the Greenwood Central School Board of Education at the May meeting, Monday night. Mrs. Virginia York, Mrs. Shirley Cook, and Mrs. Margaret Murray, elementary teachers met with the Board and discussed the mechanics of Departmentalization.

The Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Patricia McCaffrey who has been on maternity leave effective the end of the school year. Two teachers were appointed to different positions and the resignation of Mrs. Anna Zuscchin accepted at the last Board meeting, was received. Mrs. Barbara Presley has been named to teach Fifth Grade instead of Vocal Music and Miss Marianne Wadek will accept a combined Vocal Music and Art position instead of her current Sixth Grade teaching position. Mrs. Anne Zuscchin was named to teach Sixth Grade.

Plans were made for Board representation at a discussion and meeting in Albany May 29 and 30 regarding the annexation with Canisteo study.

The Board approved the purchase of meat for the Junior-Senior Banquet May 24 and decided to hold the Employee Recognition Dinner June 5.

Copies of the New York Pupil Evaluation Test results were distributed and action on the Media Selection Policy was tabled. The Board restated its policy of cooperation with other schools to allow students to attend these schools to get an appropriate program or to allow other students to attend Greenwood to get a particular program. The determining factor is if transportation to or from the other schools is available.

It was decided that since no school days were lost because of snow that school would be in half day sessions June 8, 19, 20 and no school June 20 - 21 for elementary students.

The Volunteer Firemen were called out at 5:30 Monday night when fire of undetermined origin broke out in an upstairs room of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dyche on the Christian Hollow Road. The fire was discovered by Mr. Robert Painter of Hornell, who was installing a water pump in the cellar. He told Firemen he smelled smoke before discovering the fire. He turned in the alarm which was answered by Greenwood and Rexville Firemen who brought a tanker to the scene under the Mutual Aid System. Greenwood Fire Chief Bryan Higgins directed the operations.

The fire was kept in the upstairs and attic area by firemen fighting the blaze. There was considerable water damage throughout the home. Neighbors and firemen removed the furniture on Town Highway trucks to the Howard Sherman barn for safekeeping. It was returned Friday. Neighbors housed the family. The Firemen drew water from a trough on the property.

A Greenwood Fireman, Erwin Allen suffered smoke inhalation. He was taken by Greenwood Ambulance to the St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell, where he was treated and released. Another Fireman received a hand injury while removing furniture from the home.

The Greenwood Town Board night reviewed its insurance coverage and voted to purchase a "package plan" covering fire, burglary and vandalism through Nelson Henry of Canisteo, who met with the Board.

Highway Superintendent Edward Mullen reported most of the flood repair work has been completed. The Board voted to offer its other 1961 truck for sale. Mullen reports the men repaired the Agway Bridge this week with new flooring.

Mrs. Daniel Redmond of West Greenwood, was honored recently by being named Teacher of the Year in Canisteo. The Canisteo Rotary Club honored two teachers at its annual ladies night dinner at the Ponce de Leon Restaurant in Hornell, Saturday.

Mrs. Harriet Stewart Redmond, elementary teacher at Canisteo Central School, and Perry Cornell, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Jasper Central School, were the honorees. James Roach, Supervising Principal at Canisteo, made the presentation to Mrs. Redmond. He noted her 20 years service at Canisteo as well as her previous teaching experience in Bath, Bradford, Jasper and Greenwood. He said that "at a time when she is nearing retirement Mrs. Redmond was most concerned with improving the educational program for her students" and largely through her efforts the Fifth and Sixth grades were departmentalized. Mrs. Redmond has resigned as Fifth Grade teacher at Canisteo and will retire at the end of the school year in June. We are proud of her good record.

There's More Than Sunburn

It was one of those first hot days of early spring, and Joe S. and his retired father had gotten out on the lake early. They were picking up enough walleyes to make it a lot of fun, but when the wind died down Joe's Dad began complaining about the heat. Then he said he was dizzy. He was pale - perspiration was no longer running down his face but his skin looked damp.

Finally, the old man said he felt too lousy to fish, and that's when Joe knew something was wrong and headed for the dock. While they were loading up the car, his father collapsed and he was rushed to the doctor. He'd had a mild heat stroke and would have to be hospitalized.

For a long time Joe kicked himself for not recognizing the symptoms of heat exhaustion, but like most other fishermen he knew nothing about first aid.

Now, I'm the last guy to paint fishing as a dangerous sport, but like all outdoor pastimes, even golf, it has its hazards.

If Joe had known something about heat exhaustion he would have taken his father out of the sun at first signs of discomfort, cooled him off as much as possible, kept him quiet, given him cool - not cold - water to drink and a couple of teaspoons of salt.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion: are pale, sweaty skin, weak and rapid pulse, shallow breathing, normal or below normal temperature, dizziness or faintness.

Heat exhaustion itself is not often serious but it can lead to something that is, heat stroke. Heat strokes often are fatal.

All fishermen and boaters should know first aid for drowning victims, which is, of course resuscitation.

Experts teach the mouth-to-mouth system these days because it is the safest, fastest, easiest, and usually most effective way to get a drowning victim breathing again. Everyone has seen illustrations and should be familiar with the procedure. It is also used in cases involving shock, choking, and heart failure.

Another emergency for which every angler must be prepared is the fish hook snagged into flesh. Dislodging a hook is really a job for a doctor, but first aid for a hook that will not back out is to work it around and push the point through the skin again past the barb snip off the point with pliers and then back it out. The resulting wound should get professional attention as soon as possible because infection is likely and tetanus a possibility.

A compact first aid kit, available from any pharmacy, is a necessary item for your fishing gear. And if you cannot attend a first aid course, at least read up on the subject in one of the fine manuals that are available.

Don't let an accident spoil your fishing and boating fun this year - and there is a little more to watch out for than sunburn.
