Veterans News

Veterans who for compelling reasons, may be forced to sell their GI loan financed homes may have their home loan guaranty restored by the VA, according to James J. McLaughlin, State Veterans Counselor.

Some of the reasons, explained the counselor, include ill health, condemnation by federal, state, or local government for highway or other construction, transfer of employment by a veteran's employer, loss of employment and subsequent moving to another locality for employment, or if the size of the home constitutes a health hazard. An increase in the size of a veteran's family, is not, in itself, sufficient grounds for entitlement restoration.

He noted, too, that fire, flood, or other natural disaster is also sufficient grounds for restoration of loan entitlement.

The veterans counselor pointed out that the veteran must first be released from liability to the VA on the original loan before entitlement can be restored. This is usually accomplished, the counselor said, by paying off the guaranteed loan in full.

Veterans desiring further information and counseling on GI home loan entitlement restoration should visit the New York State Division of Veteran's Affairs counseling center located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville, N. Y., on Tuesdays, and at the City Bldg., 108 Broadway, Hornell, N. Y., on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.
