On Wednesday May 30, Andover traveled to Bolivar for the Annual Bolivar Relays held under the lights. The Panthers placed sixth out of a nine team field with a total of six points.

The Shuttle Hurdle-Relay Team of Bill Cornell, Tom Weibezahl, Shawn McCormick and Russ Godown set a school record with a time of 56.5 while the 4 Mile Relay Team of Steve Walker, Charlie Dougherty, Terry McCormick and Marty Grossman also set a school record with a time of 25:22.1. The 2 Mile Medley Relay Team of Charlie Dougherty, Russ Godown, Steve Walker and John Davis also set a school record with a time of 10:45.2. The three previous relay records were set as this was the first time they have ever been run from our school.

The Mile Medley Relay of Rick Cahill, Bill Cornell, Brian Cannon and Chris Mattison placed fifth with a time of 4:16.3 while the 440 Relay Team of Dennis Ordiway, Brian Cannon, Roger Godown and Dave Haugh also placed fifth with a time of 52.8.

The Mile Relay was one of the closest races of the night with Andover taking fourth place just being beaten out for second at the finish line. The team of Rick Cahill, Roger Godown, Mike Bliss and Chad Grossman ran the event in 4:05.3. The meet was run in wind and rain which slowed the times down.

## WILDERNESS FISHING ON A BUDGET

For my money, our good neighbors to the North in Quebec are doing more to preserve wild brook trout fishing in a wilderness setting than any present day angler might expect.

And, it doesn't cost that much money for the Parks Branch is carrying out the program in some of the Quebec Parks. You can enjoy native brook trout fishing like your grandfather used to remember, and you can do it at budget rates.

Take, for example, the trip a group of us just completed to the Montagnais Camp in Quebec's vast Laurentides Park. We took native specks up to three pounds on flies and nymphs — weighted muddlers were deadly — where our only neighbors were loons and white-throated sparrows. Accommodations included good beds with linens; delicious meals served in a beautiful lodge; outcamps for the real nature lovers; and friendly competent guides. All this averaged out to about \$35 a day per man.

Cost of the drive up was not averaged in and you can drive if you call the last few miles on an old logging road driving. One of the big savings is no fly-in costs, in a day when wilderness brook trout fishing generally means air transportation.

Another factor is the Quebec Parks' program of providing access to anglers while maintaining natural trout populations and the environment.

The reason for this, I think, is that the people in charge of the parks program are fishermen themselves. Any of the Quebec Parks men I've ever met would rather talk fish or fishing than anything else. And this time of year you will find that they have been on the water themselves within the last day or two — they know the condition of their waters, and whether or not fish are being caught. I've never yet met a swivel-chair parks man in Quebec.

Montagnais Camp is located on the western side of the Laurentides Park, and is reached via Route 19 from Trois DIVERS and Montreal. The setting is the secret hunting and fishing grounds of the Montagnais Indians who contested the territory with other Indians as recently as 1895.

The Laurentides Park is located just 60 miles north of Quebec City, and all the other fishing camps are accessible from Route 54 which runs the length of the park and Route 169 which branches off toward Lake St. John.

All of the camps are operated on a reservation basis only, and you should inquire about openings at the Park Branch headquarters at Quebec City.

To check on the Montagnais in particular you can write or call Rosaire Claveau, Camp Montagnais, Lac Beauhette, P.O.; tele. 418-643-7740. I might see you there — I'm going back!
