## School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday, June 11, 1973, by the President, Mr. Carl Atwell. Mr. Weibezahl and the following Board Members were present: Carl Atwell, Francis Horan, William Walker, Conner Stephens, and Mary K. Slade.

The minutes of the May 14th meeting were read and approved. Motion was made by Carl Atwell, seconded by Francis Horan, passed by 4 votes of yes.

Mr. Weibezahl read the total certified General Fund Warrant—amount \$29,598.22. Francis Horan made the motion that these be paid and Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Title II Basic Bills were read for approval — \$41.12. The motion to pay these was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by Conner Stephens. Accepted by 4 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria bills totaling \$4,255.20 were read for approval. Conner Stephens made the motion that these be paid and William Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Flood Recovery bills in the amount of \$4,800.04 were read. Conner Stephens made the motion and Francis Horan seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Federal Title I bills were read for approval. Amount — \$1,159.18. Motion made by Carl Atwell, seconded by Mary K. Slade. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's report was read for approval. Francis Horan made the motion that this report be accepted as read. Mary K. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Weibezahl, showing a net profit of \$642.76 as of the end of May 1973. A motion was made by Francis Horan to file this report with the minutes. Seconded by William Walker and carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Board approved the payment of the amount due on the New School Bond which is — Principal — \$25,000.00 — Interest — \$3,100.00. Francis Horan made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Payrolls amounting to \$42,487.53 were read to the Board for their approval. William Walker made the motion that these be approved. Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion and William Walker seconded that the President pay the Revenue Anticipation Note of \$181,674.26 and interest of \$2,267.43. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion that various transfers be made within Subsidiary accounts per list enclosed with these minutes. Carl Atwell seconded — passed by 5 votes of yes.

We, the Board in order to economize, and promote efficiency, have made the following adjustments in the faculty.

The additional Art Teacher will be discontinued as of the end of the school year. William Walker made the motion, Francis Horan seconded that we dispense with this service.

The expected enrollment next year will be 25 to 27 for the Kindergarten class and 28 for the first grade. Therefore we are having one teacher for each class. (Mrs. Corwin has retired). Francis Horan made the motion, Conner Stephens seconded and the motion was made and carried with 5 yes votes.

Miss Sullivan's Commercial Class will be cut to 1/2 time. Carl Atwell made the motion, Mary K. Slade seconded, carried by 4 votes of yes. One abstention.

Spanish will be eliminated in the Seventh and Eighth grades, a Senior Class English Class will be absorbed by the English Dept. Spanish I, II, and IV (combined) and Spanish III will be taught. Francis Horan made the motion, Conner Stephens seconded. Motion to move to 1/2 Spanish was carried by 4 yes votes. There was one vote in opposition. It is our plan to phase out Latin and in the future resume Spanish full time.

Francis Horan made the motion to accept the Bid results on Duplicating Paper and Spirit Master sets. The low bid was accepted from A. B. Dick Company for all items bid. Conner Stephens seconded. Carried by 5 yes votes.
