## CALICO BONANZA

There's not much doubt about it, the hottest calico bass fishing in the world is taking place right in our own backyard at Black Lake near Ogdensburg.

Also known as crapples - and by 54 other names throughout the U. S. - this prolific panfish is providing an angling bonanza that is hard to believe. Using 1/16-ounce yellow jigs on a recent trip we would sometimes catch a fish on every cast for five or six casts in a row.

The best calico fishing is in the spring when the fish are schooled in very shallow water near brush. Later on, it is much too weedy to fish these locations and the fish move out anyway. But during late May and early June, the calicos are found in great numbers in the shallow, muddy bays.

I was fishing with Ray Loucks, who lives on the lake, and Bob Murray, a former resident. With such a storehouse of Black Lake knowhow, I was soon pulling in the calicos. We passed one boat trolling down the middle of the lake and Ray commented "They might as well be fishing in the Sahara Desert". Like every place else, you need a little local information to catch fish.

Ray's technique is to clip a pencil bobber about a foot to 18 inches above the jig. This permits casting the rig with accuracy right up around brush and under water snags. The bobber keeps the jig floating freely, and you work it back to the boat in jerks

with a little pause in between. Later, according to Ray, the crapples congregate around shoals in deeper water, and he fishes for them with 1/4-ounce jigs. Heavy catches can be made during the summer, but it's not as fast and furious as the spring fishing.

What about those catches? We kept only the larger fish, and ended up with over 200. We certainly caught over 400, with some pike, bluegills, and perch thrown in. When three rods can land over 400 fish in a few hours of leisurely casting - we had a big thermos of coffee to keep us warm and some sandwiches to occupy us - I call it about as good fishing as you will find on this earth.

There are few, if any, active guides on Black Lake. One excellent source of information is Hauck's Hotel, located at Edwardsville, where Route 58 crosses Black Lake. Bill Hauck is active in the local area Chamber of Commerce, and is an expert on where the fish are hitting any particular time, as well as providing rooms, meals, and boats.

Ray Loucks runs some fishing camps and rents boats about three miles east of Edwardsville, is a former guide, and is probably the single most knowledgeable guy on the lake.

The calicos first appeared in the lake in numbers some 10 years ago, and the population explosion will not last forever. But right now, Black Lake offers the fishing experience of a lifetime.
