

Mrs. Conde acted as part-time Lbrarian in Andover from 1946 to 1951. She continued as Librarian and taught tenth grade English to 1951. After that she became a full-time Librarian becoming responsible for not only the Secondary Library but also a newly created Elementary Library made possible by the Elementary. The Elementary Library offered each grade a regularly scheduled weekly period regularly scheduled weekly period consisting of borrowing and returning books, story hours and instruction in library usage. The Secondary Library was open the entire school day, including the noon hour. Under Mrs. Conde's supervision there has been a very active Library Council who have assisted her in book fairs and the

assisted her in book fairs and the daily routine work.

The Library, having individual study carrels, books and audio-visual material for each, is an excellent source of information. Most of this has been obtained through special grants which are competitive and must be applied, for. It was Mrs. Conde's responsibility to write and apply for these grants. The Library has grown from 2900 books in 1946 to 13.000 books, an audio-vicual center and individual study carrels.

Youth employment for this sum mer is more of a problem this year than ever before. The last several years two federal programs, Neighborhood Youth Corp and the Work Study Program, provided employment for at least vided employment for at least three youths. These programs The Village felt that it should do something to ease the situation and is going to employ one or two youths, from the Village, part-time for the summer.

The Village Board has hired an additional temporary part-time patrolman. Patrolman Sonner. like Patrolman Belmont, will be like Patrolman Belmont, will be paid for one day's work a month, but will spend many more hours on the job in order to get accredited experience. While these patrolmen are getting their experience the Village gets the additional help at very little cost. The patrolman purchase their own uniforms and firearms. Patrolman Sonner has just completed the Basic Police School and is enrolled in the Police Science Curriculum at Corning Community College. He lives in Corning with his wife and small child.
