The Greenwood Town Recreation Program will start on July 9th. This program is financed by the Town and the School with fifty per cent reimbursement by the State. It will run for six weeks.

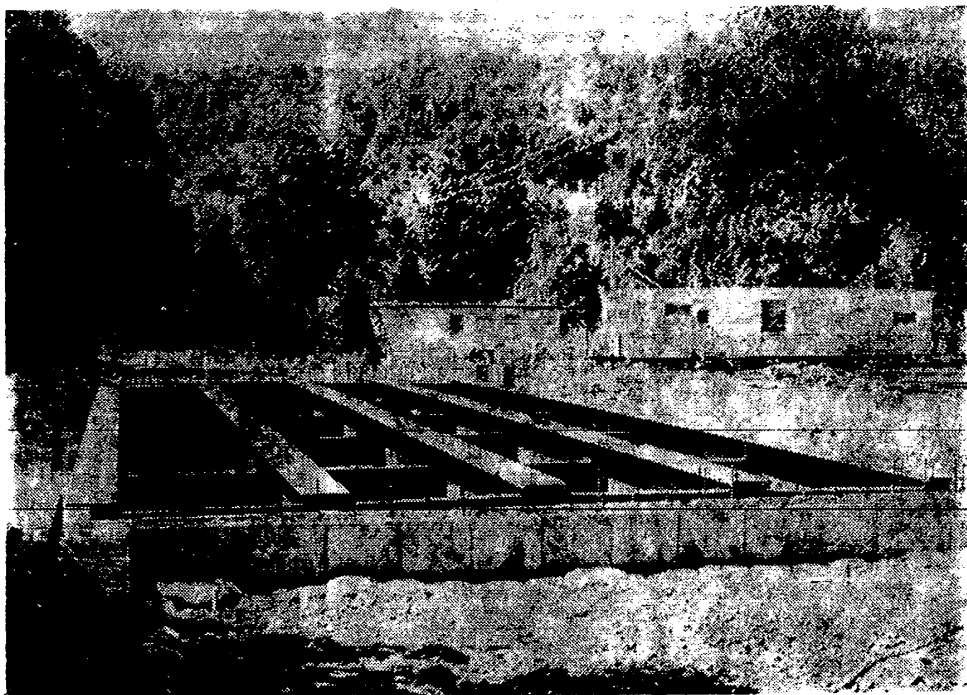
It will consist of a morning program for the children four years to fourth grade. This will be from 9 - 11.

## Bavarian Summer Festival To Be Held June 29 Thru July 15

The fifth annual Bavarian Summer festival of Barnesville, Pa. besides growing in number of days, June 29 through July 15 for a 17-day total, also has been adding to its list of entertainment features.

New this year will be a Woodmen Week-end which will have 15 of North America's leading timber men who will participate in wood chopping and log rolling contests on the festival's final days, July 13, 14, 15.

Another attraction which was held for the first time last year and proved most successful is a horse pulling contest which is expanding to over 30 competing teams. Horses will pull on July 7, 8. Other tournaments, include snowmobile races, soccer and daily golf.

Coming from West Germany and heading the list of over 40 area working craftsmen is wood carver Gustl Eich of Gstadt-Chimsee. Besides wood carving, crafts range from blacksmithing to candle making.

A German wedding is scheduled for June 30 complete with traditional German dress and a German pastor officiating. The bride and groom to be are both young craftsmen at the festival.

Over 30 German oompah bands are listed for the "Oktoberfest in July" which last year drew 200,000 persons in a 10-day run despite adverse weather conditions and publicity created by Hurricane Agnes.

A festival highlight is the huge Festival Hall which seats 3000 when besides the playing of bands, Schuhplattlers dance, an Alpine bellringer performs and Alpine horn players from Germany create unique and beautiful music.

A second outdoor beer garden has been added and both gardens will have their own bands. And the atmosphere of the grounds which now cover 120 acres with the addition of a 40-acre parking lot, has been enhanced by additional decorations and a Swiss chalet front face-lifting of most of the park's buildings including the restaurant, coffee shop and gift house.

Barnesville is located on Pa Route 54 between Tamaqua and Mahanoy City, just south of Hazleton. It is just a few scenic hours from New York City or Philadelphia. The Poconos borders to the northeast and the Dutch country to the southwest.

Admission is \$1.00 with children under 12 free. There are special rates for groups — last year 523 buses were counted. For free full-color folder write: Bavarian Festival Society, Kempton, Pa. 19529.
