**Holland - Perry  
Speedway News**

Holland, N. Y. — With a total of 14 events rained out thus far this year 20 full race cards completed and 16 or so events still to go, the United Speedway Associate, Inc., tracks of Holland International and Perry Motor Speedway are now entering the stretch drive for completion of their 1973 NASCAR stock car racing program.

Several interesting and exciting events are still listed for the completion of the season, including the three divisions season championship events, the prestigious Permatex championship event and the season finale NASCAR Late Model Sportsman championship double point spectaculars to climax the season.

In checking the win column for the 1973 season, we find the record books tell us there have been only 6 feature event winners of the U.S.A. tracks thus far. Point Leader Dick Flaig of Eggertsville has total of eight victory features, five at Holland and three at Perry. Included in these victories are the Liberty 100, Kendall 100, the NASCAR Late Model Sportsman Mid-season championship plus a Pocono qualifier.

The next big winner is West Seneca's Art Clark with four winning tries, one at Holland and three at Perry. These not only included a gold cup 50 win at Perry Motor Speedway, but a three first place week-end finish. His several runner-up finishes has retained Clark a few points behind leader Flaig. The only other double winner this year is Stroker McGurk of North Collins who also goes to Pocono for his qualifier victory.

Defending champion Steve Hill of East Aurora tops the Chargers list of victories with a total of six, four to Holland and two at Perry, including the mid-season championship. His strongest competitor and closest rival with one victory at Holland and three at Perry is Bliss, N. Y.'s Gail Barber. Silver Spring's Bobby Thomas has added up three victories, two at Perry and one at Holland plus a mid-season Charger championship.

In the NASCAR Limited Sportsman division, the feature victories are divided among nine drivers with Perry's Doug Hewitt totaling three, and point leader Dick Miller with five, four at Perry and one at Holland. The Stafford N. Y. chauffeur also claims the NASCAR mid-season Limited Sportsman Championship, at Perry Motor Speedway.

After miles of red tape had been liquidated, Saturday evening, August 4th, at Holland International will be Veterans Administrative Hospital Patient Night at the 3/8 mile oval. The management has invited all out patient (with their doctor's consent) from the Buffalo, N. Y., Hospital as guests of the Speedway.

Sunday evening, August 5th, the Atlantic Racing Clubs Full midjet race car will augment the NASCAR three star stock car racing program at Perry Motor Speedway. On the same evening, promoter Ed Serwacki has announced all race fans who have reached 5 years-over the 1/2 century mark by this Sunday will be entitled to a one (1) dollar discount off admission price to commemorate "Old Timers" day at the Speedway. Speed McFee of Rochester, N. Y., veteran of many years of competition in open wheeled race cars in this area, has been invited to be the honorary starter for the portion of the evening's program. Other western New York "Old Time" competitors expected include, Eddie Shaw, Jimmy Fox, Lenny Lorber, Johnny White, Eddie Lenz, Joe Russo, Johnny Church, Buzz Bower, Vern Heriman and Kenny Dadswell. It's a fitting salute to the many "Old Timers" on hand. Promoter Serwacki scheduled the return of open cockpit midjet competition to the 1/3 mile action oval.

The ever popular Mystery mileage car contest contains with its 40 weekly winners at both Speedways. Another innovation at either speedway which has not been resolved yet, could be the appearance of a nationally known NASCAR Grand National Driver. If the details can be worked out, USA management indicate they would desperately try to make this a thorniest occasion for all race fans attending.



**International Fishing Contest**

You get a better appreciation of the fishing we enjoy here in New York State and in neighboring Canada after spending a couple of days with 158 Frenchmen who had taken a charter flight to Roberval, Quebec to catch fish.

The vast wilderness reaches of Chibougamau Provincial Park, where they fished, was almost beyond their imagination. Some of them saw wild moose, and one group shared their lunch with three bears.

But the part that was really unbelievable to the Frenchmen was the fish — brook trout up to 4 1/2 pounds!

Actually, the French fishermen did not pay their own way to fish in North America. They were all contest winners. Among them were some of the best anglers in Europe and, also, some of the luckies. The contests were sponsored by Pernod which makes an alcoholic beverage by the name of Suze; a radio network called Europe 1; Tortue, a fishing tackle company and Air Canada.

First the lucky ones. Apparently Pernod provides trout to fishing clubs all over France for stocking in streams. Also, they secretly plant 2,000 trout with a special tag, with directions to call Europe 1 at a certain number, giving their name. The first 88 anglers who catch a tagged trout and call win an all-expense paid trip to fish Quebec.

The remainder of the charter flight was made up on the basis of skill. Much of the fishing in France consists of teasing little

minnow-like fish into biting. Fishermen stand for long hours with long poles catching these shy fish that sometimes grow as long as pumpkinseed sunfish. The size, however is not the challenge; it is the difficulty in catching these fish.

Contests were held all over France with anglers fishing spots picked by lottery, and against the clock. The eight best fishermen in each of the eight regions of France made up 64 of the winners on the charter flight.

Six additional winners were determined by corporate fishing contests in Paris, where the best fishermen of one large corporation would pit his skill against that of an angler representing another company. It was something like Ford, General Motors, and Chrysler having a fish out.

To experience the wild and free fishing that we know was the greatest difference the Frenchmen noticed. That, and, of course, the huge trout.

Another impression your columnist gathered while witnessing this international fishing expedition is that European advertisers are more sensitive to the wide appeal fishing has to a mass audience. The sponsors put \$250,000 into the contests and the charter flight to Canada, and it must be paying off for them.

Finally, the next time I get skunked I'm not going to complain. Instead I'll be thinking of all those Frenchmen fishing in somebody's backyard for a sackful of minnows.
