## Veterans News

### LISTEN VETERAN

MAY 31, 1974 seems like a long way off, but for veterans discharged between February 1, 1955 and May 31, 1966 it means the end of financial assistance for education under the GI Bill. That's less than two years in which to complete their selected courses with financial assistance. Veterans discharged since May 31, 1966 have eight years from the date of their discharge before their entitlement terminates.

**CASHING IN YOUR GI INSURANCE?** Before you do, stop and consider these alternates. If you're in need of ready cash why not consider borrowing on your GI insurance policy. The interest is only 5% compounded annually on the unpaid balance. But that's not all. Your policy will remain force and provide you with at least some insurance coverage. The loan may be repaid in installments tailored to fit your financial condition, as long as they are made in multiples of \$5. There are other avenues which you may explore. For in-

stance, you could exchange your present policy for one having a lower cash value. You would then receive a check for the difference in the cash values of the two policies. You might also check into the possibility of reducing the amount of your insurance in multiples of \$500, or not less than \$1,000, and receive the difference in cash. If you are so disabled that you are prevented from working you may be entitled to waive payment of your premiums. These alternate possibilities to cashing in your GI insurance policy still give you needed cash, yet retain some necessary insurance coverage. Want the details on any of these plans? You can get them by contacting the local counseling center of the New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville, N. Y., on Tuesdays, and at the City Bldg., 108 Broadway, Hornell, N. Y. on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.
