Ed Kent of Dyke Street, Andover, recently won the "Summer National Men's Closed Division Championship" at the "National Shuffleboard Tournament" held at Lakeside, Ohio.

Mr. Kent has been an active shuffleboard player for several years and after winning 12 trophies in Florida, in addition to placing in over 39 other tournaments, decided to compete in the Ohio Doubles Amateur Tournament at Lakeside with his partner with their placing 3rd in this contest.

Since Ed was really having a "hot streak" he entered the "Summer National Men's Closed Division Contest" and completely demoralized his final opponent in their series of games. He has possession of the large trophy pictured above for one year and then returns it next July at which time it will be retired to the Shuffleboard "Hall of Fame" in Lakeland, Florida.

Updated June 4, 1973

August 21 to August 23 — Dates for filing nominations for candidates for election to a town office made at a town caucus. (149-a-14)

(A notice of any party caucus held for making party nominations of candidates for town office shall be given by proper party authorities either by newspaper publication hereof once within the town at least one week and not more than two weeks, or by posting in ten public places in the town at least ten days, preceding the caucus — There shall be a chairman and secretary and there may be tellers, for each such caucus — no person shall participate in such caucus unless he is an enrolled party voter as shall appear from a transcript of the enrollment from the register.)

August 28 — Last day to accept or decline party caucus or independent nominations where necessary. (149-a-16)

August 31 — Last day to fill vacancy after declination of party caucus or independent nominations (149-a-16)

October 12 — First day of Local Registration. 3:00 P. M. to 8:00 P. M.

October 13 — Last day of Local Registration. 10:00 A. M. to 8:00 P. M.

November 6 — ELECTION DAY Hours 6:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. (191-b)
