#### Bottler Knows -Returnables Are More Economical

Ever wonder why soft drinks cost up to 40 percent less in returnable bottles than in throwaway containers? An Oregon bottler explains the economics of the situation:
'We've always felt the return-

able bottle was more profitable. We have bottles out there that are coming back 15 to 25 times, and they cost us 10 cents each. Conceding five cents refund to the consumer, and based on 15 trips, each bottle costs about a third of a each bottle costs about a third of a cent per trip. But non-returnables cost us four cents each, and that's lost every time. The same is true for packaging. Normally we get four trips per carton, before it's so battered we're not proud of it or can't use it any more. The returnable cartons cost 10 cents each, or aobut two and a half cents per trip. Non-returnable cartons cost 10 cents each, and again, that's lost every time it leaves the plant."
