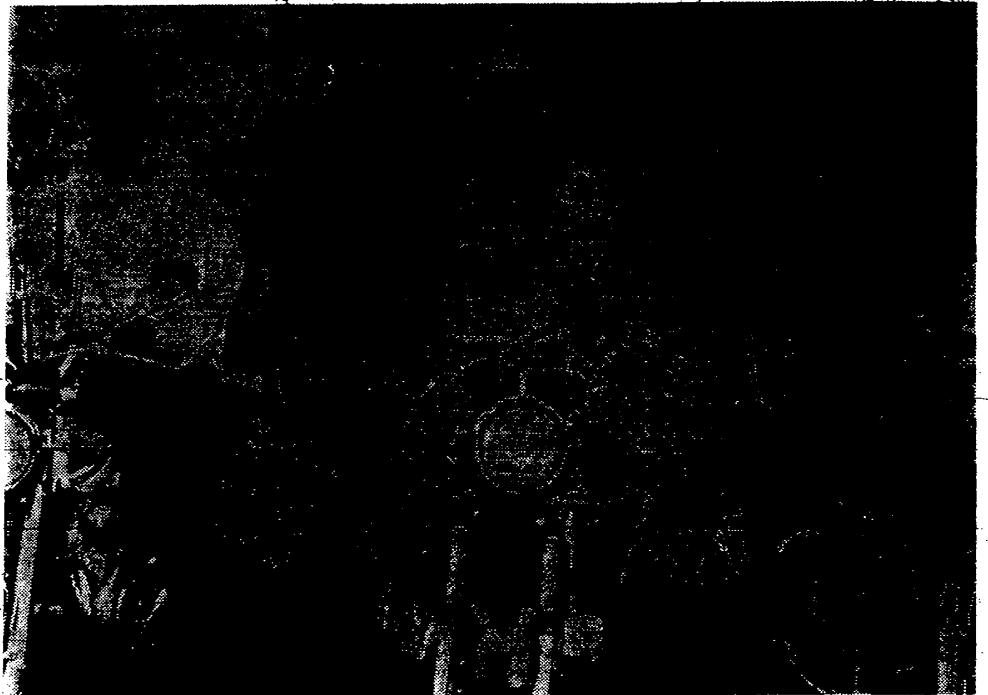
Services during the month of August are being held in the Methodist building.

1973 Erie County Fair Posters Continue Americana Theme

The Erie County Fair and Exposition's 1971 poster inaugurated an Americana theme. It featured an ancient Erie Canal boat pulled by horses and a fire engine drawn by the same source of power. The type was old fashioned. The results were startling. It became a collectors' item as memorabilia buffs snatched them up hot off the press.

The idea for the phenomena came from an officer of the Erie County Fair and Expo. He proposed the old-fashioned poster idea after purchasing a reproduction of the poster commemorating the driving of "The Golden Spike" at Promontory Point, Utah in 1869. That spike drove the last link in the rail system that connected the

Why not a commemorative poster for the Fair and Expo closest to his heart? This Fair official realized that the 1971 Sesquicentennial year was the ideal time to launch his project. Rendered by the Fair's advertising agency the poster came into such demand that it was decided to initiate a collectors' series.

The 1972 poster continued the idea and was printed on simulated parchment paper, featuring ancient type faces as well as two photographs taken at the Fair at the turn of the century. It was marked "Collectors Series No. 2".

A limited number was printed and then the negative was destroyed. Thus, each year's poster becomes a limited edition.

The 1973 poster is perhaps the most interesting of the series. It features a "crinkled" look that gives it a genuine antique look. A great variety of old and modern type faces furthers the image and introduces this year's Fair attractions from the Funfair parade to the Howdy Doody Show with Buffalo Bob Smith. Also Glenn Campbell, the Kids from Wisconsin, the Blackwood Brothers, the James E. Strates Shows and many others.

The 134th Annual Erie County Fair and Expo runs this year from August 17 through 25.

The Erie County Agricultural Society, sponsors of the Fair and Expo, is actually the oldest organization, profit or non-profit in the Country. While all other literature and advertising each year is given a modern feel, the posters have become a separate project and will continue to retain the old time look so popular with collectors.
