Minutes of the meeting held July 23rd were read and accepted on a motion made by William Dunham and seconded by Ronald Glover.

Moved by William Dunham and seconded by Ronald Glover to accept the bid of Allegany Bitumens for the Street repair work to be done on Church and Baker St., and to authorize Deputy Mayor Avery Mead to sign the contracts.

Moved by Ronald Glover and seconded by William Dunham to pay the final payment of \$1,861.30 on Rochambeau Ave.

PARENTS — How would you like to read these headlines about one of your children? — **HUME BOY, 9, CRITICAL AFTER BIKE HIT BY CAR.** The story from the Cuba Patriot relates: 'A nine year old Hume boy was in critical condition Wednesday in Children's Hospital, Buffalo, after the bicycle he was riding was struck by a car Tuesday evening.'

Russell Smith, 9, sustained a fractured skull and fractured left leg in the 7:55 p.m. accident along Route 19.

State Police said the boy rode his bicycle from the west shoulder of the road into the path of an auto.

NOW, PARENTS — do you think that it ISN'T possible here in Andover when State Route 21 goes right down our Main St.? Well, if you are open-minded, and aren't of the OLD OPINION that "Your Child Can Do No Wrong," just take the trouble to stand on Main St. (as unobserved as possible) near the corner of Center St. and Main St. — any afternoon or evening for just 15 minutes. And, if you don't see at least 5 instances where a child is not riding a bicycle properly and is taking a change on getting killed, well, you are doing a lot better than we were Wednesday morning!

We were standing next to our car near H. H. Williams Store visiting with a State Trooper in plain clothes when we saw about 10 different children on bikes come "Bailing" down Center St. and out on to Main Street without stopping, slowing down — or even looking either way. And, with a car parked illegally near the corner of Center and South Main, a Motorist on Main St. heading North towards Hornell, wouldn't have had the slightest bit of warning until the Bikes popped out in front of him.

Later on, we spoke to one of the girls that was riding a bike that we know who incidentally hadn't looked either way, and she said: 'we were playing tag on our bikes and I was watching the girl that was 'it' so that I wouldn't get tagged!'

There it is PARENTS! There is just one instance of how a child that really does know better — and has been instructed by her parents — can still get clobbered by a car — without deliberately disobeying her parents and what she has been taught. A child's mind can become engrossed in a game — and they don't have the adult attitude to select the proper site for their games.

Yes, we became involved and spoke to her parents about it — at the risk of having them becoming angry at us for taking the trouble to report it. But — even if they are perturbed with us — at least our conscience was clear, and perhaps we may have saved the child an accident in the future.

Now PARENTS — are your children playing this apparently innocent game of "tag" on their bike — on the Village Streets and State Highways? If you take the time and trouble to check — the life you save — could be one of your own children!

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, August 13, 1973, by Dr. Walker, President. Mr. Weibezahl and the following Board members were present: Conner Stephens, and Francis Horan.

The minutes of all previous meetings were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Payrolls totalling \$8,724.37 were read for approval of the board. William Walker made the motion to approve these payrolls as read and Francis Horan seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were read. Dr. Walker made the motion to approve the reports and Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The monthly bills for July totalling \$4,881.19 — General Fund were read by Mr. Weibezahl for the Board's approval. A motion to pay these was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Motion was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Conner Stephens that the President of the Board, be given permission to borrow \$20,000.00 on Tax Anticipation Note — Citizens National Bank & Trust Co. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Moved by Conner Stephens to accept the bid from Elmhurst Dairy for milk for 1973-74 school year. This was the lower of the two bids received. Seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Moved by Dr. Walker and seconded by Conner Stephens to accept low bids for paper products from Mr. Richard Silverhill and Mr. Floyd Irons. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Moved by Francis Horan to accept the low bid for food from Wheland Wholesale Co. and W. W. Giese Corp. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Moved by Conner Stephens and seconded by Dr. Walker to accept the low bid from Dunkirk Ice Cream Co., for Ice Cream Products. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Conner Stephens moved to accept the resignation from Lloyd Paul Fuller, Ruth Manske and Margaret Kelland. Seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Moved by Francis Horan to accept Mrs. Betty Jean Cary for the position of Librarian. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Moved by Conner Stephens to accept Elisabeth Berger to Secondary English Position. Seconded by Dr. Walker, carried by 3 votes of yes.

Francis Horan moved to appoint Pamela Ann Morris to a one year sixth grade position. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Francis Horan moved to appoint Paula Doughton to teach Elementary Grades. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Conner Stephens moved to raise the price of milk to 8c — less any government subsidy. Francis Horan seconded. Carried by 3 votes of yes. This will raise Class A lunch to 31c.

Dr. Walker moved to approve the Title I Program. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Francis Horan moved and Conner Stephens seconded to adopt the Federal Lunch Program. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Francis Horan moved to adjourn at 10:40. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Passed by 3 votes of yes. **MARY K. SLADE, Clerk**
