ACS Announces Free Lunch Policy For 1973-74

Andover Central School today announced a free lunch policy for 1973-74 for school children unable to pay the full price. Mrs. Charity McCormick will be coordinator. Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility:

Number in Family Unit	Gross Income

"Income" means all sources of earned or unearned monies which would be available to the family to pay the price of a child's meal. "Hardship deduction" — The above scale can be reduced by the value of the following expenses which you may have had to pay: Excessive medical expenses; Shelter costs above 30% of your "Income"; Education expenses for handicapped children; and Disaster or Casualty losses.

Families falling within these scales, which provides for adjustment for uncontrollable financial hardships, are urged to apply for free lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in an application form which may be obtained from Mrs. McCormick, School Nurse-Teacher. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any uncontrollable financial hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. Provision is included for foster children. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

John Henry Fanton

John Henry Fanton, 21, of Grove Street, Andover, was pronounced dead on arrival at the St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell late Wednesday morning, September 5, 1973, after a split ring from a tire he was changing on his truck struck him in the head.

Wellsville state police said Mr. Fanton was working on the right rear dual wheel of a dump truck. The wheel had been removed and was laying on the ground with the split ring partially loose.

Police said the tire blew, projecting the ring at the deceased's head. Mr. Fanton sustained a 10-inch laceration to the skull and a compound skull fracture with death ruled as being accidental.

Mr. Fanton was born June 30, 1952, Wellsville, a son of Everett and Juanita Wright Fanton. Both parents survive.

Also surviving is his widow, Linda Smith Fanton and a son, John H. Fanton, both at their home in Andover; a brother, Coy of Andover; two sisters, Mrs. Ger-aid (Connie) Morris of Andover and Mrs. Harold (Sandra) Ward of Wellsville; and several nieces and nephews.

Friends may call from 2 - 4 and 7 - 9 p. m. Thursday and Friday at the James B. Mulholland Funeral Home in Andover, where funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. Saturday with the Rev. Ray Al-baugh, pastor of the United Meth-odist Church of Andover, officiat-ing.

Burial will be in Stannards Cemetery, Stannards.

New York State Hunting & Fishing Day Sept. 22

Commissioner of Environmental Conservation Henry L. Diamond urged sportsmen and the general public to plan to participate in the celebration of Hunting and Fishing Day in New York State on Saturday, September 22. Many sportsmen's clubs will hold open house that day, often combining forces so that a single centralized location in a county will be staffed by several clubs.

Fish and wildlife experts from the Department's regional offices will participate at these community displays. They will demonstrate the equipment they use in their work and explain the re-search and management programs they conduct.

Hunting and Fishing Day is now a national event, explained Commissioner Diamond. Its purpose is two-fold — to salute the achievements of fishermen and hunters in support of sound conservation and to acquaint the public with the importance of the sportsmen's role.

"It is the enthusiasm and money provided by sportsmen that has been behind sound conservation since the turn of the century. In fact, from the days of sportsmen-conservationist Teddy Roosevelt, this has been true. Only in comparatively recent years has the message reached the average citizen, that we must protect our priceless heritages of air, land and water," he said.

"Not only are fish and wildlife dependent on them, but so is every human being. As we safeguard these resources, we are improving the quality of life for ourselves and for future generations," the Commissioner concluded.

As Governor Rockefeller pointed out in his proclamation establishing September 22 as Hunting and Fishing Day in New York State, "New York's sportsmen have long been in the vanguard of those

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Public Hearing On New Sub Station Held Thursday

An informational meeting on the new proposed Village Electric Sub Station was held Thursday evening, August 30, 1973 at the ACS Cafeteria at 7:30 P. M.

Only about three people not associated with the Village or the project, put in an appearance at the meeting so the Consulting Engineer has been given the authority to prepare bids for the construction of the station.

The estimated cost of the entire project was \$70,000 which included a 10% allowance for contingencies. The sub-station will have 5 times the output of the present one which is over-loaded at the present time.

It is planned to install 3 — 34.5KV Transformers which will have an output of 37.50 - 42.00 KVA and will be able to take care of any projected electric requirements for the next 20 years.

The cost of the new plant will be amortized over a 20 year period which calls for approximately a 15% raise in our present electric rates.
