A 5.5 per cent salary increase for teachers in the Greenwood Central School system for the 1973-74 year was the basis for the negotiations agreed to by the Greenwood Central School Teachers Association and the School Administration. Both the Teachers Association and the Administration have released the agreement which was reached following recommendation bade by Public Employment Relations Board appointed Fac' Finder, Donald Cullen of Ithaca. Cullen recommended the 5.5 per cent increase. He also recommended a starting salary for a beginning teacher of \$7300. The final negotiations have set the starting salary of \$7,150. The contract is a two year one with salary increases for the 1974-75 school year based on the cost of living index. The district will pay 50 per cent of the premium cost for health insurance for dependents. Personal leave will be increased from two to three days for teachers in the district over five years. Changes in the grievance procedure have been approved to allow representatives of the grievant's choice at certain steps and with the final step in the process the Board of Education.

A procedure for teacher evaluation was adopted and a tuition grant of \$50 will be given for a block of three hours graduate credit courses taken beyond 30 hours after the bachelor's degree. Payment for extra or co-curricular service were set. They are varsity basketball coach \$250, swimming team, Javee Basketball \$150 each, Senior Class Advisor and Cheerleading Advisor \$100 each; soccer, basketball and Javee soccer \$100 each and track \$50.

Snowmobile & Boat Registration News

Albany — Calling it a logical and practical move for motorboat and snowmobile owners "in the State, Assemblyman James L. Emery (R-Genesee) has halted the enactment of his legislation making it possible for the registration of these craft in local communities rather than in Albany

The Emery law (now Chapter 839 of the Laws of 1973) transfers the entire registration process for snowmobiles and motorboats from the Office of Parks and Recreation to the State Motor Vehicle Department.

"This means," Emery explained, "that owners of motorboats and snowmobiles will be able to register them at their local county clerk's office or Motor Vehicle Department branch beginning on October 1 of this year."

The Deputy Majority Leader cautioned that those registering motorboats for use this year before the law goes into effect on October 1 must still do so through the Department of Parks and Recreation.

"This period of time is needed for the orderly transition of the process from one department to another," the Assemblyman explained. "We are confident that the Motor Vehicle Department will be able to handle this job efficiently since, under Commissioner Vincent Tofany, the MVD has computerized itself to become one of the smoothest operations of its kind in the nation."

Emery also pointed out that county clerks throughout the State would receive 50 cents from each registration fee for the handling of this process. He emphasized, however, that there would be no change in the registration fee to motorboat and snowmobile owners and no change in the registration process.

"The sole intent of this new law," Emery concluded, "is to make registering of vehicles a 'one stop' proposition for many owners. At the same time they register their cars, trucks, motorcycles or other vehicles," they can register their motorboats and snowmobiles. It should be easier and more practical for everyone."

Milk Producers Belmont Meeting Open To Public

The Committee for Milk Price Improvement (CMPPI) will hold an open meeting at the Belmont, New York Grange Hall on September 6, 1973 at 8 P. M.

Due to rapid changes in the dairy industry today, this meeting will be a discussion of the most recent developments in the marketing of milk in the Northeast.

Committee Chairman Charles Frank of Belmont, will discuss the results of the United States Department of Agriculture hearings held in Clayton, Missouri on August 28 and 29, where he testified on behalf of the committee in favor of a \$2.00/cwt. (46.5 qts.) increase in the Class I fluid price for the New York-New Jersey Federal Order.

Also to be discussed will be the operation of the new "Superpool" which will raise the Class I prices above the levels set by the market administrators for the Northeastern Federal Orders.

Due to the 50% rise in the cost of dairy concentrates fed by farmers to their dairy herds during the past year, and the rapidly escalating prices paid for veal calves and cull dairy cows, the situation for the dairy industry is very bleak indeed. With the numbers of dairy farms declining, as well as the cow numbers and production per cow there appears to be a serious shortage of milk and other dairy products in the near future, unless a significant increase in the farm milk price is not shortly forthcoming.
