**Holland - Perry
Speedway News**

Holland, New York — The United Speedway Associates, Inc., (USA) tracks of Holland International Speedway and Perry Motor Speedway 1973 Fall schedule for stock car racing is rapidly coming to a close. The coming week-end of September 8th and 9th at both tracks respectively, will not only decide the track driver champions in each of the three NASCAR divisions, Late Model Sportsman, Limited Sportsman and Chargers on a double point basis, but will also highlight the Miss Permatex Beauty contest.

The ambitious Permatex championship track program has instituted over \$100,000 total and will award \$1000 to the winner of the track championship, will receive a special trophy plus beautiful trophies for the best appearing car, fastest qualifier for the evening and of course the winning driver.

In order to qualify for the NASCAR recognized track championship program for the 1974 Daytona Permatex 300 at Daytona International Speedway, the track champion will have his paid round trip to Daytona Beach, Florida, plus additional expense money, provided the track champion does qualify his race car for the 300 lap Daytona race.

Also, scheduled should be the completion of the years long point race between drivers of all three divisions. The current leader in the Late Model Sportsman division is Art Clark with 652 points, followed closely in one of the greatest battles seen on New York tracks in many a season is Dick Flaig of Eggertsville with 630 points. Rich Wrobel is third. Stroker McGurk of North Collins is fourth and Salamanca's Arleigh Hill is fifth.

In the Holland Limited Sportsman division, comparative newcomer John Kondziela of Amherst is current leader at 574 points followed very closely by Stafford's Dick Miller with 568 points. John Carpenter is third. Paul Weber is fourth and Jim Remery is fifth.

In the Charger division defending champion Steve "Goat" Hill is leader at 626 points followed very closely by the hot rookie Gail Barber of Bliss, New York at 612 counters. Jim Root, Mike Brachmann follow behind with Jim Richeal in fifth position.

At Perry Motor Speedway, Eggertsville's Dick Flaig is on top at 678 points followed by a scant 12 points is West Seneca's Art Clark at 666. Third is Phil Edwards, fourth Rich Wrobel and fifth Ed Anchor.

In the Limited Sportsman at Perry is Dick Miller who is the leader at 697 points followed by Paul Weber of Perry at 646 and Jim Remery, John Carpenter and John Kondziela.

In the Chargers, Gail Barber seems to be on top with 734 counters followed by defending champion Steve Hill at 710 and also Mike Brachmann, Bobby Thomas and Don Martsceill.

Still the hottest race conceivable is the race for the Late Model Sportsman NASCAR State championship. Leader at this time is Art Clark of West Seneca with 1318 points followed very closely by Dick Flaig who had 1308 points. This has got to be one of the hottest contests for winners down to the wire finish in many a season.

In Limited Sportsman State Championship division Dick Miller is quite out front at 1265 points followed by Paul Weber of Perry at 1162.

All USA fans have continued to enjoy the Miss Permatex Beauty contest over the recent weeks and shall award the lucky winner during the race program.

Rolling along as it has been for the past 20 weeks is the popular Mystery Mileage car contest with its monthly winner who will receive a \$100 gift certificate from this month's sponsor Sport and Custom with locations at 2225 Elmwood Avenue in Buffalo, 2429 Military Road in Niagara Falls and 1375 Orchard Park Road.

NASCAR Late Model Sportsman Limited Sportsman and Charger class cars are featured at all competitive events at USA tracks.

**1973 Duck Season
Announced**

Good waterfowl hunting prospects were forecast for this fall with the announcement of seasons by Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of Environmental Conservation in spite of reduced breeding populations on the prairie breeding grounds. Three species of waterfowl are in short supply this season, however, and are consequently fully protected. These are the canvasback and redhead ducks and brant.

Upstate generally there will be a 45-day split duck season running from October 1 through November 4 and from December 14 through December 23, 1973. This will mean the basic bag limits (with certain exceptions) are four daily and eight in possession.

In the Lake Champlain area, which takes the same season and limits as Vermont, dates are October 6 through October 21 and November 3 through December 1, a season of 45 days during which basic limits are four per day and eight in possession.

Liberal bag limits in the form of bonus birds in addition to the basic bag will be in effect in each upstate season. For the first nine days in either area (upstate generally from October 1 - 9 and in Champlain October 6 - 14) two extra blue-winged teal may be taken per day, and four kept in possession. Scaup also are in excellent supply, and during the entire season in certain upstate waters generally two additional per day may be taken and four kept in possession. In Lake Champlain, only from November 3 - December 1 is this true; this is to prevent over-harvest of the similar-appearing ringnecked duck which, although scarce, is most abundant during October.

These birds still in somewhat precarious status and the objects of an effort to allow them to increase, are again completely or partially protected. Only two black ducks may be taken per day (four in possession.) Wood duck limits are also restricted to two and four; with canvasbacks and redheads completely protected again this year.

Goose season upstate will begin at the same time as the duck season in each area and runs 70 days until December 9 in upstate generally, and to December 14 on

Lake Champlain. Three geese may be taken daily (six in possession). The season on brant is closed following a drastic decline the last several years.

For the fifth consecutive year, Long Island will enjoy a season entirely separate from those of upstate New York, New Jersey or Connecticut. Long Island will open its 45-day duck and 63-day goose season on November 19. Regular duck season will wind up on January 2, but a special scaup-only season of 16 days will be held after that, on tidal waters only, from January 12-27. During that time five scaup per day may be taken, and 10 kept in possession. The goose season, during which the limits of three and six may be taken, also run through to January 20, 1974.

Mergansers, outside the regular duck limits, may be taken at the rate of five a day and 10 in possession during a regular duck season anywhere in the State. Hooded mergansers still are limited to one per day and two in possession, as has been their status for some time.

The special sea-duck season for scoters, eiders and old squaws will continue in the Long Island region, from September 22 through January 6, 1974, when seven per day (14 in possession) may be taken. Boundaries of this area are the same as they have been since 1968, and include Long Island and Block Island Sounds, and associated bays eastward from a line running between Miamoguc Point in the Town of Riverhead to Red Cedar Point in the Town of Southampton, and including any ocean waters south of Long Island. This does not include any south shore bays. Upstate, sea ducks may be taken only during the regular duck seasons, but bag and possession limits are the liberal seven and 14 in addition to the basic duck bag.

Hunters are reminded that the special scaup season and bonus and the special blue-winged teal bonus are temporary concessions from the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and wildlife in relaxing restrictions on species in good supply. However, hunters are warned to be particularly careful in identifying ducks at these times, since there may be other ducks in the same waters which may not be taken. It is up to hunters to understand and abide by the rules of the game.

If waterfowl hunters cannot or do not distinguish between ducks in limited supply and those that are abundant, bag limits for all species will have to be set low enough to be tolerable to the least abundant species.

Shooting hours for all seasons and all species are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. All

waterfowl hunters 16 years of age and older must have a Federal duck stamp, which costs \$5 with all proceeds committed to improving habitat for migratory waterfowl.

Copies of the complete New York waterfowl regulations will be available from all hunting license issuing agents and Environmental Conservation Department regional offices after September 15.

**New Regulations On
Life Preservers**

Boatmen, planning to take advantage of season end sales, will do well to keep in mind the new regulations for Personal Flotation Devices according to Parks and Recreation Commissioner Alexander Aldrich. As of October 1st there will be an upgrading of the life preserving equipment required on waters under joint New York State and Federal control.

The new Coast Guard regulations, applying to all craft of 16 feet or more, require that there be a wearable flotation device for every person on board and, in addition, one throwable device, ring buoy or buoyant cushion. Wearable devices include the life preserver jacket, buoyant vest or special purpose packet or vest.

Craft under 16 feet may use buoyant cushions, one for every person on board, as they have in the past or any of the jacket types. This flotation gear, if recently manufactured, may carry a designation as Type I, Type II, Type III (all wearable) or Type IV (buoyant cushion or life ring).

If you are going to buy now or later, make sure that the life preserver is Coast Guard approved and that it complies with the requirements effective October 1st. There also must be a proper personal flotation device in the boat for water skiers. The ski belt does not qualify.

(Continued from Page 1) who demand protection for our air, land and water, as well as for the fish and wildlife which are dependent on them. They share in the credit for our progress toward improving our environment.

Chief executives in local jurisdictions across the State have also issued proclamations on Hunting and Fishing Day in their counties, cities and villages. Local sportsmen's groups have generally found ready acceptance of such proposals from their elected officials.

Last year the Governors of all 50 States issued Hunting and Fishing Day proclamations, along with the President. In addition, there were a large number issued by smaller jurisdictions throughout the country.
