The State Transportation Department has awarded contracts for bridges and flood restoration projects in Allegany and Steuben Counties. Les Strong Inc., at \$728,451 was apparent low bidder for repair work for Bennetts Creek bridge on Route 248 on the Canisteo Road. The flood-damaged bridge over Bennetts Creek will be replaced with a two span 236 x 44 foot bridge. In addition to deck work the contract includes rebuilding a quarter mile of highway approaches with two-lane asphalt pavements and relocating Call Hill Road for about 700 feet.

The State Department of Transportation will open bids for roadwork in Steuben, Allegany and Livingston Counties on October 4. In Steuben County, bids will be accepted for reconditioning Route 248 for 5.3 miles in Canisteo and Greenwood from the South line of the Village of Canisteo, South to Coby Creek. The 16 foot road will be widened to 22 feet and resurfaced. The work also calls for rebuilding a short section of the highway South of the Village on an improved alignment to ease curves and for improving four bridges in the project area with new railings and resurfaced decks.

Action on items necessary to formalize the negotiate agreement between Greenwood Central School Teachers and the Administration was taken by the Districts Board of Education, Monday night. The Board approved: Personal leave of three days a year for the teachers who have been employed by the District for more than five years, and personal leave of two days a year for those who have been at the school for less than five years.

One hundred percent health insurance payment for teachers and 50 per cent for their dependents. Starting teaching salaries of \$7,150 per year and cost of living increases over last year's salaries. Fifty dollar one time only tuition grants for Greenwood teachers taking advanced courses.

An extra step in the co-curricular teacher payment schedule. Each item was approved four to one, with Board member John Driscoll dissenting in each instance. A related item approved unanimously was the extension of fringe benefits to non-teaching employees as well as teachers.

In other action, the Board, approved two mothers dealing with access to school property by non-students. Driscoll's motion "Students proceeding to or from a School Bus that is not assigned to the Greenwood School should be directed in inclement weather, to assigned areas if they abide by all regulations", was approved four to one, with Board member Ron Putnam dissenting. Board member John Hunt's motion providing that spectators should be able to observe school athletic events or practices was passed 4 to 1 Putnam dissenting. The two mothers followed a long heated discussion.

**Vocational Adult Ed Program Announced**

Through the cooperation of the county school districts and the Board of Cooperative Educational Services, an extensive vocational program will be available to out-of-school residents of this area again this fall.

Each course is designed to provide a new skill or to upgrade an existing skill. Most courses will run for a ten week session, totaling 30 hours. Classes will meet Monday through Thursday evening and Saturday — one session each week. Courses will be held at the Andrew F. Haynes Area Occupational Center housing the County's Area Occupational Center.

**Special Bear Season & License Announced**

Big game hunters planning to participate in the special early bear season this fall were cautioned to be certain they are carrying the correct license in addition to their special permit. The special bear season, in all or parts of 12 Northern Zone counties, runs from September 15 through October 10, according to Herb Doig, Director of the Division of Fish and Wildlife.

Hunters afield from September 15 through September 30 must have their 1972-73 big game license on their persons. That is the license that most bought for last fall's big game season. After October 1, however, they will need their 1973-74 big game license. This is because New York's license year runs from October 1 through the following September 30.

Only one special bear permit is required, even if you hunt before and after October 1. Doig emphasized. Special bear permits are available for a fee of \$2 and may be obtained by mail or in person from one of the three Department regional offices serving the area. The addresses are:

The special early bear season is open September 15 to October 10 in all of Clinton, Essex, Hamilton and Warren Counties, as well as portions of Franklin, Fulton, Herkimer, Lewis, Oneida, Saratoga, St. Lawrence and Washington Counties.

Mail order applications will be accepted if postmarked no later than September 28. The \$2 fee must be remitted in the form of money order, cashier's check or certified check. Personal checks cannot be accepted and must be returned. Cash should not be sent through the mail. To apply by mail, an applicant need only send the fee and his name and address. He should not mail in his license nor any portion of it. If a hunter wishes to apply in person at one of the three offices indicated above, he may pay cash for his permit. Permits will be on sale at the three regional offices on week-days during regular working hours through the entire early bear season.

Permit holders are entitled to take one bear during the early bear season in addition to the one bear allowed during the regular big game season. Hunters taking a bear under the permit are required to report to the Department within 48 hours of reaching a road. A toll-free telephone number (1-800-342-9832 is manned for reporting 24 hours a day. Cooperation by the public will enable Department biologists to obtain such biological information as age, sex, date and location of kill.

The early bear season offers hunters an extra opportunity to hunt this most challenging of New York's big game trophies and also is a good opportunity for hunters to scout the area in which they will be hunting during the regular big game season.

Last season 39 bears were taken during the early bear season. This year's is the seventh early bear season conducted in the last 10 years. The Department is authorized by law to conduct such a season when, in its opinion, bears are numerous enough to support additional harvest.

Despite the fact that bears may be frequently seen during the summer at local landfill sites, town ordinances usually bar hunting at these areas. The best place to hunt is where bears are feeding in the early fall, in the woods where natural foods are abundant at this time of year. Bears will be seeking late berries, apples and such attractive woodland crops as beechnuts and acorns.
