

Andover Medical Center Trailer Delivered Friday

The Andover Medical Center Trailer which will be used as an independent nursing station was delivered Friday, Sept. 21 and installed on the Hannon lot at the North End of Main Street.

The Board of Directors of the Rural Management Association of Allegany County, Incorporated, announces the installation of the independent nursing station in collaboration with the Andover Medical Center. Target date for the initial use of this facility at 17 Main Street in Andover is October 8th.

The Andover Medical Center was established in the Fall of 1972, to help meet the health needs of the Allegany County Citizens. That the physicians, Dr. F. C. Miller and Dr. D. V. Tartaglia have been warmly welcomed in the community is evidenced by their rapidly growing case load. In order to meet the health needs of the ever-increasing patient population the board has moved to expand by establishing this nursing station staffed by one nurse and one nurse's aid. It was felt that the station could handle approximately 25% of the patients now seen by the physician.

There will be close consultation among the members of the health team, especially the nurse and physicians. The nurse will see patients referred to her by the physicians as well as carry a case load of her own. This will include health assessment, health teaching of all ages, and follow-up care of individuals with chronic or long term problems. The nurse in charge of this station will be Miss Therese Farley who has her R.N. degree from St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell and was a nurse at Jones Memorial Hospital in Wellsville until joining the Andover Medical Center in Fall, 1972. This announcement was made by Dr. Irwin Felson, Chairman of the Rural Management Association of Allegany County, Incorporated and Mr. Robert L. Clark, Administrator of the Andover Medical Center.

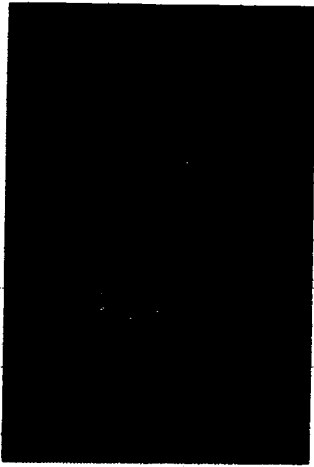
News That's Print To Fit

"Jim" Mulholland, who accepted the position as General Chairman, conducted the business meeting at which many important decisions were made after a unanimous vote was made on each decision.

Scout News

President Bradley Maxson of the Seneca Council, Boy Scouts of America, has announced that a special round-up program for new members will be launched by the Cub Packs, Scout Troops, and Explorer Units of the Seneca Council beginning September 1. More than 600 new Cub Scouts, Scouts and Explorers are expected to join the program in the period from September 1 through December 31. Maxson explained.

The Seneca Council is divided into three Districts. The Central District which includes those Cub Packs, Scout Troops, and Explorer Units in Olean, Allegany, Hindsdale, Portville, Weston Mills area are expected to recruit over 170 members in existing units and 100 new boys are expected to join new units now being organized. Western District comprising most of Cattaraugus County will bring in more than 200 new boys and Genesee District which covers most of Allegany County will bring in another 200 new boys.

Special emphasis will be placed on October 3 when School Night for Scouting will be held in most of the schools in Central and Genesee Districts. Special programs will be put on by local Cub Packs and Scout Troops to acquaint prospective members with the Scouting Program.

Cub Scouting is for boys who have completed the second grade or who are 8, 9, and 10 years of age. The theme for this year's round-up for Cub Scouting will be "Cub Scouting is something else — try it you'll like it". Scouting is for boys who have completed the fifth grade or who are 11 years of age or older and the theme is "Scouting — try it, you'll like it".

Special recognitions will be available including a recruiter strip for those cubs, scouts, and explorers who recruit a new member for their unit; for the Cub Pack, Scout Troop and Explorer Unit which reaches their goal by December 31 a special Honor Ribbon will be presented and to the Cubmaster, Scoutmaster or Explorer Advisor whose unit qualifies for the Honor Ribbon will receive a special BoyPower-ManPower Coffee Mug.

Cub Packs, Scout Troops and Explorer Units which register their unit on time during this period will receive special recognitions if the unit does not show a loss in membership when they recharter.

Glaucoma is a disease of the eye. It usually occurs in middle age and older persons. Loss of sight may occur if Glaucoma is not controlled.

Early diagnosis, adequate treatment and medical supervision are the basis for control of Glaucoma. A periodic eye examination is a means of early detection.

The Andover and Alfred Lions Clubs are sponsoring a Glaucoma Clinic on Thursday evening, October 4, 1973 from 7:30 to 9:30 in the Andover Central School Cafeteria. Two ophthalmologists (medical doctors specializing in diseases of the eye) will be available for examining eyes for Glaucoma. This is a free clinic.
