## Hinkle Tower Dedication Oct. 13

Dedication of the Hinkle Memorial Bell Tower will highlight local observance of the 25th Anniversary of the State University of New York in Alfred, Saturday, October 13.

The dedication ceremony is part of an open house scheduled from noon to 5 p. m. that day at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred.

The two-year college is one of six agricultural and technical colleges among the 72 units of the State University system. Established in 1908, Alfred was one of 29 institutions which became part of SUNY when the system was formed in 1948.

A campaign to raise the \$90,000 necessary to complete the memorial bell tower and other private projects on Alfred's New West Side campus is presently under way and is to culminate with the open house on the 25th Anniversary of SUNY.

Supervised by Gerald McCartney, director of development at the college, the current campaign involves faculty, students, the College Council, such organizations as the Educational Foundation of Alfred, Inc., and other friends of the college.

Several college administrators, faculty, and members of the Alumni Association board of directors are serving in key roles in the current campaign. Paul B. Orvis, who presided Hinkle as president of Alfred State College, is national chairman for the campus completion program.

The open house at Alfred State College will begin with the tower dedication at noon and later will include open house tours with student guides, a band-choir concert at

2 p. m., a horticulture open house, photo exhibit, and tours of the farm complex from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m.

Named for the late Walter C. Hinkle, president of the college from 1909 until his death in 1964, the tower contains a Westminster chime with five bronze bells cast by the I. T. Verdin Company of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The bells, each equipped with a custom-designed inside striking selector which in turn is programmed from a time clock, are placed within a 63-foot tower. The tower also contains a four-face clock and a clock-controlled carillon to project music over the campus through four large speakers.

Erection of the tower has already been completed on a knoll in the central area of the West Side campus. Work is expected to be completed well in advance of the Oct. 13 dedication and open house.

Dr. David H. Huntington, college president, has invited the public to attend the entire afternoon program.

He notes that the memorial bell tower, built entirely with private funds, will serve as a lasting and unique tribute to an educator who devoted 27 years of his life to the college.

The special day has also been designated as "Alumni Homecoming" and many graduates are expected to join faculty and guests at a campaign victory dinner-theater program that evening.
