**Lee Ryan Reports From Allegany County Legislature**

My article this week will deal with the Health Survey of the Community Health Information Profile that was completed the early part of this year. The Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Western New York, Inc., and the Allegany County Comprehensive Health Planning Organization should be recognized for initiating this project and providing the funding. There was no cost to Allegany County.

Allegany County had not had a Health Services Survey in years, so several of us on the Health Services Committee were very much behind this and in view of the rough study I had made in 1970 of the extended care and nursing home facilities I was very much pleased when we were able to engage Dr. Harvey Sultz and his staff from the State University of New York at Buffalo to do this survey.

By providing planners and decision makers with enough current information about the population to be served and the services available, a health profile can provide the foundation for sound service programs. I will only try to cover what I consider to be the highlights of the survey.

A community health information survey does not solve the communities' health care problems. It provides the diagnosis. The choice of treatment or forms of treatment must come from within the community, from those who provide care and those who will use the services.

The Health resources of a county include the institutions providing organized health care, the physicians and other health professionals.

There are two general hospitals in Allegany County. The one in Cuba has a licensed capacity of 55 beds, all of which meet federal standards. There are 39 medical-surgical, eight obstetrical, five pediatric, and three intensive care beds. The hospital in Wellsville, before the June flood, had a licensed capacity of 84 beds; as of February this year the bed complement was 96 — 73 medical-surgical, 11 obstetrical, and 12 pediatric. The State Hospital Review and Planning Council has given approval for the construction of an addition which will provide for a total of 102 beds.

At the present time, there are three nursing facilities in Allegany County. Cuba Hospital houses a nursing home of 30 beds, all conforming to state and federal standards. Mary's Nursing Home in Wellsville is a private, proprietary facility with a complement of 30 beds, 12 of which are licensed and conforming. The Wellsville Nursing Home, a private proprietary facility, has a licensed capacity of 80 beds, all of which are conforming. Besides this, there are 21 privately owned homes in Allegany County which house many elderly people. The homes are approved by the Commissioner of Social Services by the department at predetermined rates. Most of these handle fewer than five persons each. These facilities do not provide medical and nursing care but do provide assistance with the activities of daily living. At the time of this survey, 68 persons resided in these 21 homes.

There were 27 physicians providing patient care in Allegany County as of September 1972. Sixteen of the 27 were general practitioners three were in medical specialties, three were in surgical specialties, and five were in other special fields.

The number of physicians had increased by six, or 29 per cent, since the beginning of 1971. Even with the increase, the ratio of physicians to population in Allegany County is still lower than that of its neighboring counties. The average age of physicians in Allegany County is 50.7 years. Thirty per cent of the physicians are under 40 years of age and 37 per cent are 60 years or older.

There are 16 dentists in Allegany County, again we are low in comparison with our neighboring counties.

Alfred University School of Nursing at the time of the survey had 184 fulltime nursing students in a four-year program. SUNY Ag Tech has two-year pro-

grams to train nurses, medical laboratory technicians, medical records and medical office assistants. There were approximately 570 students enrolled in these programs. Some of these students, as part of their training, work in Allegany County facilities and can be considered a health resource for the county.

The Allegany County Department of Social Services is located in the former county home outside Angelica. There were 1500 people on public assistance, and 1700 families or 5000 persons on Medicaid in Allegany County.

The department identified 49 Allegany County residents presently in nursing homes outside Allegany County. This number represents a relatively high percentage of County residents in all nursing homes.

In regard to hospital utilization, the survey showed that roughly 63 per cent of Allegany County residents used the two hospitals at Cuba and Wellsville while the remainder used hospitals outside the county but closer to their place of residence.
